THE INDIANAPOLIS GARDEN CLUB HISTORY

1930 - 1962

In presenting this little history of the Garden Club, your editors are well aware of the shortcomings, and aware also of the impossibility of creating a picture that will meet with each member's personal knowledge and affectionate recollection.

Leaning heavily on the premise that a smiling portrait is liable to pall through the years, we have decided to be starkly representational, giving mostly a compilation of facts. It is our hope that these facts will recall to all of you the pleasure you had, the hard work you put in, the triumphs and disappointments you experienced; and that in that recollection you will each add for yourselves the grace notes of warmth and friendship and well-earned satisfaction.

On June 15th of 1930, Mrs. John N. Carey invited a few friends to her home, Haverway Farm, for the purpose of discussing plans for forming a garden club in Indianapolis. This small group, consisting of Mesdames Jacquelin Holliday, Thaddeus Baker, Perry O'Neal, Katharine Holliday Daniels, Stuart Dean, Herman Wolff, Robert Failey and Charles Latham, became therefore our founding members. These eight and Mrs. Carey then in turn invited twenty others to join them in establishing the Indianapolis Garden Club. Our charter members were Mesdames Sylvester Johnson, Jr., Booth Tarkington, Clarence Stanley, Mary June Carey Appel, Garvin Brown, Samuel Dowden, Bowman Elder, James Fesler, Clarence Forsythe, Theodore Griffith, Frederick Holliday, Louis Levey, Lily Ridgely Lilly, Charles Lynn, William Scott, Roy Shields, W. Richardson Sinclair, Frank Stalnaker, Larz Whitcomb and Evans Woollen.

Two meetings were held that summer, then in the fall of that year, the first Executive Board turned to the business of adopting a constitution. After reading and discussing the constitution of the Pasadena Garden Club, Mrs. Katharine Holliday Daniels was selected to draw up an outline form, incorporating many of its provisions. This was done and accepted by the membership at large in November. It is interesting to note that the membership was limited to thirty; however, in two years' time this number would be increased to fifty. The six officers and the chairman of the Program Committee constituted the Board. Admissions were first passed on by the Board. Those names accepted were presented to the membership at the next general meeting where they were voted by ballot, with three negative votes deferring acceptance. Three years of active service sufficed to qualify for associate membership. Meetings were held every second Friday of the month; the annual meeting came in November; and the dues were \$8.00 for active members.

Our constitution, altered many times with changing circumstances, has nevertheless stood us in good stead, and is a tribute to the foresight of our early members. Our purpose, not officially recorded at first, was all the same unswervingly adhered to: "to stimulate the knowledge and love of gardening; to aid in the protection of native plants; and to encourage civic improvements."

While we list an assortment of events taken from these early meetings, no factual reporting can possibly evoke the feeling of enterprise and adventure that permeated those days. One has only to talk to any member who was part of them to see that they shared in an experience that meant much to them and cannot quite be described to those of us who came later in the day, with the way clearly marked ahead.

The meetings were small, informal, and held in homes, with tea following. The speakers for the most part were excellent and frequently paid for by some generous member, as the Club treasury was modest indeed. The standard of gardening ability was high and many of the members could, and did on occasion, substitute for a professional speaker. Most of this

is still true today. Perhaps the difference lay in the pioneering spirit that enhances all new organizations. Everyone was eager to encourage the aims of the new Club and promote the love of gardening and the sense of civic responsibility that they felt so keenly themselves. In this they had varying success as may be seen in the following account.

Our Club's first public action (1931), taken at the suggestion of the North Civic League, was the petitioning of the Board of Public Works to do away with the homes at the entrance to the Crown Hill Cemetery "that this location be made more sightly." Our first joint enterprise (1932) was the inclusion of our president in a group meeting at the Art Institute for the purpose of forming a State Federation of Garden Clubs. Our Club was invited to be a charter member and later, in 1933, Mrs. Lucy O'Neal was elected president of the State Federation. In 1932 came our first offering to the public, a course of three lectures on garden planning, held in the Public Library, and conducted by Miss Virginia Prince, L.A. A tactful secretary rather sadly notes: "There were fewer of the public (present) than expected, perhaps due to the inclement weather."

Money was given in 1933 for the purchase of seeds for the Community Gardens' Project in support of Mrs. O'Neal's leadership in this endeavor, which had the double benefit of aid to the unemployed and beautification of the city. It is comforting to note that in the depths of the Depression 4200 applicants were provided with seed and that land for gardening purposes was made available to 1500 needy individuals by this municipal undertaking.

In 1934 we joined with the Federated Garden Clubs in backing a bill for roadside improvement which was defeated in the 1935 Legislature. We voted in 1935 to support Mrs. Clowes, who with Mrs Carroll initiated and developed the Garden Tour of Park School, a very singly successful venture that has become justly famous and done much through the years both for Park School and gardening interest throughout the state.

Twice we assisted at the Home Complete Show, taking first place for our garden there in 1935, and second place in 1938.

A full scholarship of tuition with all expenses was provided for John H. Wallace, to the Audubon Society School in Maine for two successive years - 1939 and 1940. In 1941 we sent Mr. McCoy of the Garden Center at Holliday Park to Cleveland, to see the very fine garden center there.

During these years, civic projects were constantly under consideration, and much time and energy were expended, the influence of the Club being brought to bear in the interest of beautification and civic betterment. We were partially successful in a quiet way, but where our efforts depended on political cooperation we were often frustrated by the short-sightedness of the city officials.

No picture of this pre-war period for our Club would be complete without the mention of the very successful and very charming "fairs" that were held at the homes of various members. The "Pike Township Fair" in 1939 at the home of Mrs. Sutphin on DeLong Road; the "Delaware Township Fair" in 1940 on the Conner Prairie Farm, with hostesses Mrs. Eli Lilly and Mrs. J.K. Lilly, Sr; and the "Clay Township Fair" in 1941 at "The Meadows", home of Mrs. J. P. Frenzel. In all these ventures, energy, ingenuity, and gay festive feeling were combined to create in miniscule, by and for the membership alone, all the effects of bounty, profusion and harvest plenty that characterize a country fair. Few who were members then will forget the thrilling parade of groomed and beribboned percherons and cattle, that provided the climax to the Delaware Township Fair, a day all felt to be a red letter day in our Club's history.

The years 1939 and 1940 brought us our first year book and the very amusing pro-

gram, an "Information Please" meeting at which members "stumped the experts", and vice versa.

Also in 1939 Mrs. O'Neal's dahlia "Pickaninny", which she hybridized herself, won a blue ribbon at the the New York Flower Show, as did one of her flower arrangements.

The Conservation Committee in 1940 under Mrs. W. Richardson Sinclair staged a one-day Conservation School in the auditorium of L. S. Ayres. Speakers were drawn from the Indiana State Conservation Department, Purdue Agricultural College, and various Federal agencies of the State.

During that period the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc. met at French Lick. Our representatives on the Conference Committee were Miss Betty Bertermann and Mrs. Richardson Sinclair. The Indianapolis Garden Club undertook the truly sizable task of decorations for this event as well as supplying exhibits.

A major contribution, under the presidency of Mrs. Failey, and tirelessly undertaken by Mrs. D. Laurance Chambers, Conservation Chairman, was the support of efforts to save the virgin timberland known as Cox Forest near Paoli, Indiana. To help purchase this land from the lumber company that had bought it, our Club contributed \$100.00 and about \$650.00 was given by individual members. These funds, along with others, saved the forest which is now under the State Park system.

By far the most important event of this period from the viewpoint of the development of the Club itself, was our admission to membership in The Garden Club of America in 1939. Sponsored by the Garden Club of Dayton and the Garden Club of Cincinnati, duly visited and recommended by various committees, we were informed in January of that year of our election. From this period on, our activities and interests, while maintaining the same aims, broadened to include a more national viewpoint.

The fall before Pearl Harbor found the Indianapolis Garden Club busily engaged in various activities and celebrating the autumn season by a fair. However, with war an actuality, the Club turned promptly to doing its bit in many enterprising ways. In order to conserve on gas and food, formal meetings were curtailed to a minimum, but with encouragement from The Garden Club of America and realization that our Club as such could provide worthwhile contributions to the war effort, a more regular schedule was resumed and a full program of patriotic activities embarked on and maintained.

Work was started in cooperation with The Garden Club of America on planting in the Billings Hospital area. Mrs. Robert Adams was appointed War Fund Chairman and became our representative in Garden Club of America plans there.

It soon became apparent that equally important were the needs in other areas of the Fort. We took a special interest in the Recreation Center, furnishing and equipping its Recreation Room.

One novel form of money raising was the auction, organized by Mrs. Griffith and her Exhibitions Committee, held at the home of Mrs. Clowes. Bids were made on attractively wrapped packages with the bidder unaware of what was inside. All in all the members and their guests donated \$424.00 by this means. With this money all forms of games, cards, tables, and numerous recreational needs were supplied. In addition, a donation of money for furniture was made to the Senate Avenue Service Men's Center. Later, gifts of seeds and garden equipment were made to Flanner House, and at the Fort, continued needs constantly developing, it was decided to furnish the porch of the Motor Pool Quarters. Mrs. Adams' report in 1943 lists \$1,332.34 given by individual members for furniture and equipment. Our war work earned for our Club a commendation from the Garden Club of America.

There were other and equally important war projects as well, and among them was the work at Stout Field. Mrs. Eugene Miller was our representative in this, and as a director of the Indiana Federated Garden Clubs, she joined with them in planning and overseeing the landscaping of the area around the Officers' Club. In this endeavor she was greatly assisted by Mrs. Bowman Elder.

In the meantime a great number of members were canning, dehydrating, freezing and preserving fruits and vegetables. For many, these were skills that had to be learned, but they set to with a will. A report sent in at the end of 1943 shows a positively heroic total. So outstanding in this regard was the record of Mrs. Bowman Elder that an issue of "Indiana Gardens" carries her modest and entertaining report about it.

War work did not completely eclipse other Club interests and the same publication has an article by Mrs. Richardson Sinclair on the preservation of wild flowers. Mrs. Sinclair was hostess that year to Mrs. John Luis Franke, chairman of the Conservation Committee of The Garden Club of America, who spoke to the Club about the "Friends of the Land" organization.

An interlude of fun during those dark days is recalled in a delightful account by Mrs. Herman Wolff of the rollicking meeting based on the "Dr. I.Q." radio show. Mrs. Wolff's report was printed in the Garden Club Bulletin for March 1944 and closes with the final catch question: "What kind of a plum is the result of careful grafting?". The answer was "a political plum".

In 1945 the Club voted to sponsor a project for the development and improvement of the outdoor recreation and picnic area attached to Billings Hospital at Ft. Benjamin Harrison. Mrs. Perry O'Neal, acting in her capacity as vice-chairman of the Red Cross Camp and Hospital Committee, made the plans and directed the work of what proved to be a major enterprise. This included grading and tilling the area; construction of a screened shelter-house and grill, an open dance floor and covered band stand; also equipping badminton, horse shoe and other game courts. Thirty-three hundred dollars was raised for this project by the Club members, largely through personal donations. Serving on the Garden Committee of the Office of Civilian Defense, Mrs. O'Neal also did valiant work in the Victory Garden field.

It was during this period, in the year following, to be exact, that recognition of our club came in the appointment of Mrs. Clowes to the Board of The Garden Club of America, to serve as a director for a three-year term. This was, of course, most helpful to us all, as it brought us into closer contact with the overall national viewpoint.

In the succeeding years, the attention to conservation, which had never lapsed during the War, shows up more clearly in the record. Among many active workers in this field, the names of Mrs. Elder, Mrs. Eugene Miller and Mrs. Richardson Sinclair appear again and again. A constant succession of scholarships to summer conservation classes were offered by the Club to eligible candidates, mostly teachers, to increase their knowledge in this field, and through them to reach the younger generation. Two teachers were sent to a summer conservation camp at Denison, Ohio in 1944. That same year, for the first time, Purdue University, the State Department of Public Instruction, and the State Conservation Department sponsored a Conservation Education Camp offering a six weeks' summer course at Versailles State Park.

From the beginning, the Versailles venture had our interest and support, with succeeding years finding us increasing our participation. We were not only good friends of their activities but through the efforts of Mrs. Eugene Miller, brought their needs and value to the attention of other Indiana Garden Clubs. Another very worthy conservation enterprise

was the campaign known as the "Save-the-Shades Fund", through which a section of virgin timberland would be preserved as a public park. Mrs. Albert Rabb, conservation chairman for our Club at this time, appealed for funds from our membership, receiving over \$600.00 in response as our contribution.

Conservation, in fact, was and is a very major interest in our Club and it was no accident that it was conservation that was chosen as the main theme of the Zone meeting to be held in Indianapolis.

May 11th and 12th, 1949 found us engaged in entertaining the Central Zone, our first venture in this field. Mrs. Keyes Atkins was our president and Mrs. Perry O'Neal, our Zone Meeting Chairman, assisted by Mesdames Griffith, W.R. Sinclair, Eli Lilly, Joseph J. Daniels, Conrad Ruckelshaus and Samuel Sutphin. Luncheons at the homes of Mrs. Clowes, Mrs. Elder and Mrs. Sylvester Johnson, Jr. were followed by a tour of members' gardens, including those of Mrs. Clowes, Mrs. O'Neal, Mrs. Griffith, Mrs. Eli Lilly, Mrs. J.K. Lilly, Jr., Mrs. Noyes, Mrs. Stevenson, Mrs. Lyman Ayres, and Mrs. J. K. Lilly, Sr.

That evening at a dinner at Woodstock Club, Mr. Paul B. Sears of Oberlin College spoke on Conservation. The following morning brought the business meeting, followed by a buffet luncheon held at Foster Hall.

It is very likely that no one now remembers the reports that were made there, or who the speaker was (Mr. Paul Uhlman), but no one who was at Foster Hall that morning will forget the wonderful figure of Helen Hokinson inspiration that was standing outside the hall to greet the guests. This was a life-sized dummy, amply stuffed, dressed in a printed silk, size 42 dress, a navy blue straw hat perched on her head, her generous bosom supporting long strands of pearls and a large delegate's name card. She was the hit of the two-day session and served as a reminder that the fun we had was not overshadowed by the hard work willingly contributed.

In reading the minutes, it would seem that the membership barely paused in its efforts to entertain its sister clubs at the Zone meeting before plunging back again into its numerous everyday activities.

Our interest in the Versailles Conservation Camp continued, and it was largely due to the inspiration of one of our members (Mrs. W.R. Sinclair) that the program that had been planned to instruct only teachers, was enlarged to include public school children as well, so that the children who were the ultimate goal of our teaching program were given a first hand knowledge of their heritage in the land around them. Assured by our Club of financial assistance and backing, the School Board permitted the sending of selected groups of 6th grade school children in the spring and fall of 1951 to the Versailles Conservation Camp. This proved such a success that in 1952 over four hundred pupils attended, at planned intervals of two weeks duration for each child. Naturally, we were much gratified at the success of our efforts and felt our donations of time and money were well rewarded. The Garden Club of America was most interested in this program, and there was even thought in our Club of proposing the project for a Founders Fund award.

But alas, the program was to continue only one more year. In 1954, the State used the buildings in the Versailles Park to house convicts, thus terminating any public school plan. The next year, at a meeting of the School Board, any future revival of the project was eliminated by the board's action of voting against participation as interfering with the school schedule.

In the meantime we were donating funds to a greenhouse at the Girls' School at Clermont, a project of the Indiana Federated Garden Clubs, and were given a blue ribbon as the largest contributor.

An additional interest was the furnishing and maintaining of a small room at the Service Men's Center, called the Hermit Room. Thanks to Mr. Joseph Cain, the P.R. Mallory Company donated a record player. Our Club, under Mrs. Eli Lilly's direction, saw to the completion of furnishings and curtains. "Good" records were made available through the instigation of Mrs. Herman Wolff and the room has continued to provide the boys with a retreat for quiet listening, reading, and rest. For the first year or two, maintenance in the form of straightening, sorting records, and dusting was carried on by our own members. Then, feeling the objective achieved, we turned over these duties to the staff at the Center.

We were, in addition, becoming increasingly concerned over the general disorderly condition of roadsides and city streets. Sending out a letter to all Indiana Garden Clubs to enlist their support, we made our own protests to the proper officials. The Indianapolis Star, stung by a comment of John Gunther that Indianapolis was the dirtiest city in the United States, had promoted a campaign called "Yard Parks" to urge, encourage and teach our citizens to improve and care for their own property, and to develop a sense of civic responsibility toward the city as a whole. Our Club was asked to have a representative on their Board and Mrs. Blaine Miller, Jr. was appointed to serve in that capacity. Later the Federated Garden Clubs were also represented on this Board in the person of the president of the Central-West Zone, but it is an indication of our early interest and her own effective service that Mrs. Miller was asked to be a permanent Board member in addition.

In 1954, through this organization, we heard of the plan to have benches bearing advertising placed at the bus transit stops. Mrs. Miller and Mrs. Charles Latham attended the City Council meeting where this was discussed and Mrs. Miller made what The Star later described as a "fiery" speech against the proposal. We are grateful that the proposal did not succeed and take pride in our share of the fortunate result.

In 1957 Mr. Richard Emery, principal of the Harry E. Wood High School, spoke to our Club, telling of his efforts in behalf of his pupils. The school in the old Manual High School building on South Meridian Street, is partly trade school, partly academic in scope. Mr. Emery's success in inspiring and helping his pupils had been so notable that an article in the Reader's Digest had been devoted to him. His dynamic personality electrified the membership of our Club, and all felt that to assist the school's biology department would be a most worthy project. Mrs. Frederick Appel, as our project chairman, and her committee, worked long and faithfully, consulting with the school and with various specialists. It was determined that \$3,000.00 would purchase a very adequate greenhouse. This would provide the students with the means for practical experience in horticulture and offer an opportunity to many to learn skills otherwise unavailable to them. A five-week money raising plan was embarked on, each member responsible for selling ten chances of \$10.00 each for a new Ford Thunderbird. Mrs. James Carroll, assisted by Mrs. Willis Adams and Mrs. John Williams, conducted a whirlwind campaign, achieving their objective in record time. When Mrs. Carroll left for Europe with the mission successfully accomplished, she did so with the thanks and gratitude of the entire membership.

The greenhouse was promptly purchased, installed and put to use. It has made possible a course in horticulture and plant science. Those passing the course receive a certificate which helps them find jobs in market gardens, florists' establishments and other similar fields. As a matter of practical experience, it has not only benefited special students, but increased the interest in growing things throughout the rest of the school. One hundred sixty-seven children entered a contest for growing tomato plants, plants that were started in the greenhouse from seed donated by Purdue. Prizes were donated by our Club. Undoubtedly for most of the children it was their first experience with the pleasures and

perils of horticulture.

Our experience with Wood High School has been very rewarding. It is a matter of pride to us as well as benefit to the school that one of our members made possible the purchase of sufficient adjacent grounds to provide the school with land for gardens. It seems fitting that an article about our activities in the connection, written by Mrs. Perry O'Neal, was published in the Bulletin.

Although the minutes show a far earlier interest in improving planting around the Monument Circle, it was not until 1958 that serious efforts in that direction were undertaken. From then until 1962 our Club, under the chairmanship of Mrs. John Williams and her successor, Mrs. Russell Fortune, Jr., bent every effort toward effecting a permanent improvement there. Much was accomplished - the donation of thousands of tulip bulbs, both by Mr. Frits Loonsten and by the Club; money for 1,800 chrysanthemum plants was raised by appealing to the downtown merchants; a luncheon of civic leaders was held and a general emphasizing of the importance to all civic minded citizens of the attractive appearance of the Circle was effected. Countless hours were spent in consultation with landscape architects, commissions and boards. Unquestionably the planting we were able to arrange was greatly enjoyed by the citizens at large. Certainly the plans for the future were handsome indeed. However, in 1962, on finding that State aid for maintenance would not be forthcoming, the Club reluctantly came to the conclusion that the project could not be carried forward, and therefore discontinued its activities in this area.

It was during the time of highest hopes for the Circle improvement that the Central Zone Meeting was held in Indianapolis. Eighteen months of planning went into this two-day meeting and all felt that time and careful preparation paid off. Mrs. Edward Mayer and her co-chairman, Mrs. Reily Adams, worked long and hard, pleasantly and effectively, as did also practically the entire membership in one way or another.

With the GCA Annual Meeting to be in Honolulu in 1961, it was felt that the delegates would be better able to enjoy the Zone Meeting in the fall, instead of adding it to an already full late spring schedule. October 3rd and 4th were chosen and we were blessed with clear skies and lovely autumn weather.

Mrs. William Atkins, with Mrs. Nicholas Noyes assisting, gave a dinner at Mrs. Atkins' home the night before for early arrivals and their hostesses.

Registration and coffee preceded the business meeting held the morning of October 3rd at the Herron Museum of Art. As there was an exhibit of Japanese prints being held at the Museum, the tables for coffee and the west walls in the auditorium were decorated in Oriental fashion. After this meeting small luncheons followed and then visits to the gardens of Mesdames Perry O'Neal, Frederick Appel, Nicholas Noyes, Theodore Griffith, Lyman Ayres, G.H.A. Clowes and Bowman Elder. After a delightful cocktail party at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Frenzel, the formal dinner was held at Woodstock Club. Here tables in the ballroom were decorated with large black terra cotta cupids holding candles and brilliant flame-colored gladiolus. Mr. Arnold Davis was the speaker, giving a gay and amusing talk. But the high point of the evening for the entire membership was the awarding of The Garden Club of America medal of merit-in-horticulture to Mrs. Bowman Elder, a richly deserved tribute.

The second day's meetings were held at the Chinese house of Mr. and Mrs. Eli Lilly where a closed Presidents' Council took place, as well as the Conservation and Horticulture meeting, following which luncheon was served by girls in Chinese costumes.

While this Zone meeting had no Helen Hokinson figure to highlight its entertainment, the presence of twenty-eight wire frame, ivy covered eagles is not to be readily forgotten,

and those to whom fell the job of transporting, shipping and displaying these national symbols clad in green, will probably long remember them.

Looking back, it is fair to say that the overall feeling was one of pleased relief in the very evident success of the undertaking, with heartfelt gratitude to the many who labored so long and hard to achieve it. Our president, Mrs. Springer, received many well-earned congratulations. But it was left to one of the chairmen, Mrs. Mayer, to comment at one point of crisis, "If I've lived through two wars, I can last through two Zone meetings!"

In the spring following the Zone meeting a new opportunity arose for a civic project. The Art Association asked our Club if we would donate the planting around the new wing of the the John Herron Art School. This was unanimously agreed to by our membership with a pledge of \$5,000.00. Our civic affairs chairman, Mrs. Russell Fortune, Jr. (and later Mrs. Blaine Miller, Jr.) and her committee, immediately went into action, working with various landscape architects, with the school officials, and with the architect of the building, Mr. Evans Woollen. It was decided to pay for this gift partly with funds from our own treasury and partly by voluntary donations from individual members. An additional source of income was provided by a flower arranging clinic conducted by Mrs. H.C.L. Miller (Alice Holliday Miller) of Richmond, Virginia, sister of Mrs. Perry O'Neal. This was held the following September and increased our funds by over seven hundred dollars. The job is done now, the planting accomplished and paid for, and the successful completion of this endeavor is a satisfaction to us all. It remains now only for us to look around for other worlds to conquer.

The past year the minutes show items about Christmas plans, about Founders Fund awards, about speakers, delegates to meetings, yearly donations to various student funds and in general, all the standard activities of a normal garden club year.

It is a full year even when not occupied with a major project or a Zone meeting, and many members devote much time and talent to making the wheels go around. Much is done yearly for horticulture, for conservation, for civic affairs, and for organizational upkeep that is never mentioned in the minutes. It is with a keen realization of the hopelessness of giving adequate credit to all our busy members that we close this record. The story is not finished. It is in the nature of an active organization that there is no ending, no climax, no neat tying up of the ends. We rejoice that this is so and look to the future to bring many more happy and successful years to the Indianapolis Garden Club.

EPILOGUE

Eight years have passed since the first edition of our history was written. In this second printing we have noted the principal events of the intervening time in our continuing calendar in the succeeding pages.

To sum up briefly, it would seem that these years have brought us into ever increasing contact with our national officers and organization as well as with our sister clubs. Various of our members have served and are serving on the Board of The Garden Club of America and at present our Zone Chairman is our own Irving Springer (Mrs. Frank C. , Jr.). All of this, of course, has been of the greatest value to us, helping to keep our outlook from becoming too local or too regional!

These eight years have also encompassed yet another Zone meeting in Indianapolis.

With Mrs. Springer and Mrs. Blaine Miller, Jr., as co-chairmen, we again demonstrated that we can work effectively together and achieve our goal, however ambitious that goal might seem in the beginning.

Coinciding with the opening of the new building of the Indianapolis Museum of Art on

the beautiful grounds of Oldfields, we were pleased to have contributed a newly planned and planted garden - The Garden of the Four Seasons, adjacent to the Alliance Pavilion. Mrs. John Mead and her faithful committee, to say nothing of many extra helping hands, achieved a notable success following the landscape design of Mrs. David Moxley for which the latter won a first place award in the contest judged at the Zone meeting.

The Four Seasons Garden and the planting of trees in five places along the canal, the latter a civic project, inspired and encouraged by Mrs. Charles Latham and Mrs. Russell Fortune, Jr., met with better success than we have so far been able to achieve with our most ambitious civic plan, the development of a Nature Center at Eagle Creek Park. As noted in the calendar, the Center is still not a reality although there is still hope. Much time, thought and careful planning have gone into this, and our members are to be commended for their efforts.

Looking toward the future, perhaps the most promising circumstance has been the change in the general public outlook towards all those goals the Indianapolis Garden Club has pursued from the very beginning. We have promoted conservation, preached environmental responsibility and aided community beautification mostly in a world that seemed bent on commercial exploitation of our natural heritage. Now, at long last, the tide is turning.

Supported by public concern rather than general indifference, it seems far more likely that some of our fondest dreams might still come true.

1963-1984

“The fellow who raises a garden, like the fellow who marries for money, never figures in his labor.” The Indiana humorist, Kin Hubbard, said it, but the Indianapolis Garden Club has proved its validity.

A prime example was our decision that our members would profit by learning landscape planning and plotting to scale in a semi-professional way. The Four Seasons Garden at the new site of the Indianapolis Art Museum was chosen as a contained area in which to exercise our new skills. Twenty years later we still have that committee and that garden; spring, summer, and fall, it is diligently weeded, replenished, gifts are sought for fountains, pumps, benches, and major accouterments.

Another project that was more complicated than we thought at first is the “Hoosier Heritage” garden at the Governor’s Mansion. Not only did members wade through tomes of Indiana authors (have you read Ben Hur recently?), searching for mention of flowers beloved in Indiana literature, but after the garden had been planted (with generous help from a local nursery) and plaques citing the proper quotation erected, there was that weeding, weeding, weeding.

And there are others. Twenty years ago our club was asked to help decorate the ground floor of the handsome Lilly home on the grounds of the then new Art Museum (now known as the Lilly Pavilion of Decorative Arts) tastefully in the spirit of Christmas. This we are still doing, although we now share the responsibility with the Federated Clubs in the area - our Christmas gift to the community.

As a memorial to one of our beloved members, a dwarf conifer garden was planted on the grounds of the Art Museum, initially funded by members of her family. Again, we are still faithfully adding to and maintaining it.

When the idea of planning and renovating an area of rundown Lockerbie Square was proposed in 1965, it was decided that it was much too big a project for our garden club.

Lockerbie Square was a twelve block collection of shabby Victorian frame houses, rubbish-filled vacant lots, and a deteriorating glove factory surrounding the stately brick home of Indiana poet, James Whitcomb Riley.

However, by 1974, when Historic Preservation inspired us, it was an idea whose time had come and we embarked on what we expected to be a year's project: raising money and attracting people to this area by holding a Garden Party in the yard at the Riley home. It turned out to be an inspiration all right, a huge and tremendously successful start toward funding for and interest in the beautification and landscaping of this near-downtown area. The Garden Party, held in May of 1975, raised \$18,000 and attracted literally thousands of people to a burgeoning residential neighborhood. A memorial tree-planting scheme resulted in a fund of nearly \$12,000 for forty-five London plane trees (*Platanus acerifolia* - *P. hybrida*) to line the streets. City officials urged us to continue the momentum, so this became our Bicentennial Project and another successful Garden Party was held; fifteen more trees were planted, brick sidewalks refurbished and vintage streetlights installed with the cooperation of the Street Commission and Citizens Gas and Coke company. A final year of labor involved the designing, stitching, and raffling of a needlepoint rug of Indiana wildflowers which netted an additional \$5,000 for the Bicentennial Fund. Today in Lockerbie Square, houses are being renovated, lots are neatly fenced off, the glove factory is metamorphosed into attractive condominiums. Young professionals may walk to work; and in the spring, guess what? - they host their own Garden Party! Our Lockerbie Project received the \$1,000 Sears award from The National Council of Garden Clubs.

At Conner Prairie Farm, a working village museum of the 1830's, open to the public and much used by schools, we were asked to plant an orchard as it would have been during that period (persimmons and apples); we did. Now proposed is a "dye" garden, containing a variety of plants used in early textile dying, as well as a decorative entrance to the museum grounds. In addition, we are considering whether to plant a cutting garden and plant flowers around a vegetable garden in the manner of these intrepid pioneer women.

Some of our successful projects have been on a smaller scale: a modest wildflower walk on the Art Museum grounds; planting crabapple trees on the banks of the Water Company's canal close by heavily trafficked thoroughfares. Fifteen years later they are in breathtaking bloom each spring. (For this, we won the Sears Roebuck Civic Concern Award.) We helped give the Children's Museum a working greenhouse, used daily in suitable programs. This museum was also the recipient of a computer from us, complete with programming done by two of our members, demonstrating the importance of water. The program, "Water, What Do You Know About It?" continued as a permanent educational tool even after the exhibit, "Extinct Is Forever", was completed. Then these two members have been asked to prepare more programs. Who says grandmothers can't keep up! Hardware, software, rams and roms - these two have learned it all!

In some places we've seen a need, so we "planted a seed and watched it grow". Among these "seeds" we count a Nature Center at the largest city park, Eagle Creek. We also count a modest start in beautifying the center of downtown, Monument Circle, by obtaining a donation of 2,000 tulip bulbs and directing the Park Department in replanting these beds as the seasons progressed. From this seed, today our downtown area is alive with plants, trees and fountains. On the Art Museum grounds again, the Lilly family owned an operating greenhouse. When the Museum moved to these spacious grounds, the greenhouse had fallen into disrepair. This it remained until one of our members encouraged its renovation, and quietly contributed funds toward this end. At first manned entirely by volunteers, ours and the community's, today it is run by skilled professionals, budgeted by the Museum, and has become almost self-supporting by sales of popular as well as rare and unusual

plants to the public. It has an educational impact as well.

Some of our projects were an outgrowth of the interests of The Garden Club of America. When hortitherapy was emphasized, one member was inspired enough to raise over \$137,000 in contributions (almost single-handedly) for a greenhouse at Goodwill Industries for the Handicapped. A two-year period of raising money and building the greenhouse resulted in a flourishing business, aiding both the handicapped and the community. Two events, open to the public, got their impetus from the GCA: one, a lunch meeting called "Wealth from Waste", in 1973, on the virtues and rewards of recycling, and the other, a symposium on the fragility of our water supply. Both events were attended by government representatives, industry and labor leaders, as well as an interested public. Our continued interest in conservation has resulted in three members' serving on the GCA Conservation Committee. Because of this influence, we are at present working toward a local Chemical Disposal Day for collection and safe disposal of hazardous household wastes. This is an idea which is spreading across the country of informing as many people as possible that most of us, unsuspecting, are handling very dangerous substances and containers in our homes and gardens.

Selling wildflower plants in connection with a local House and Garden tour has proved popular, and the "postcard project" has led us to collecting seed from the Royal Catchfly (*Silene regia*), Indiana's most endangered species of wildflower, and trying to propagate it ourselves.

Along with our good works, we have had our share of laughs. One member was heard to remark, "I've lived through two World Wars, I guess I can survive another Zone Meeting!" We had a Garage Sale (yes!) to raise \$6,000 quickly. What a memorable sight it was to behold some of our dignified ladies rummaging through prized items from others' discards. We hosted a community luncheon at the renovated City Market one rainy day. Never mind that an unidentified man from the audience gamely stood there to be "umbrella holder" for the guest speaker through the entire speech. It demonstrated quite graphically the need for a new roof. Strange dichotomies: the year of Lady Bird Johnson's anti-billboard campaign some members were working hard to remove offensive billboards around the city; at the same time we were offered a free billboard promoting a city-wide clean-up, the "Pitch-In" campaign. We accepted the gift.

We, along with other conservation groups, confronted the entire Army Corps of Engineers who were going to flood a natural hardwood forest and habitat of rare plants. We received a letter from the Governor congratulating us on our success in saving it. Big Walnut Valley is now owned by the Nature Conservancy.

We donned hard hats to tour the city's sewage treatment plant. We were surprised to find out that engineers come from all over the world to tour this facility since it employs the most advanced state-of-the-art in the world! Not one of us, despite the heat of the day, would brave the drinking fountain at the end of the tour. Incidentally, they use, in this ultra-modern plant, a "waterlifting wheel" device invented by the ancient Egyptians. "Plus ca change, plus la meme chose".

We have had a steady stream of workshops from propagating and pruning to terraria and topiary. We give annual flower shows, sometimes bravely open to the public. We continue to give yearly monetary contributions to civic and conservation causes, and literary contributions to *The Bulletin*; we recognize our outstanding members with appropriate awards. We continue to have our club represented on many civic committees such as the Mayor's Downtown Beautification Committee, the Northside Corridor Development Plan, Historic Preservation, as well as the Indiana Chapter of the Nature Conservancy, the Art

Museum, Children's Museum, and Goodwill Industries.

With all our ongoing projects and all our city's grand schemes for the immediate future, the Indianapolis Garden Club no doubt will have much to add to this account by 1988. As we envision these possibilities, we continue to tend our own private little gardens, not figuring in our labor, but taking time along the way to smell the flowers.

1988-1992

The Indianapolis Garden club has continued to fulfill its purpose:

to stimulate the knowledge and love of gardening,
to aid in the protection of native plants,
and to encourage civic improvements.

The year before this history begins, but after the last history was written, the Indianapolis Garden Club made possible the placement and planting of 24 large concrete planters that brightened the city for the thousands of athletes, from throughout the hemisphere, who converged on Indianapolis for the Pan American Games. It took much planning, meeting and cajoling of city agencies before the planters were in place; however every summer since, the city has been abloom with flowers. The Garden Club has donated trees to beautify a major city boulevard.

The club's principal effort has been the raising and donating of nearly \$44,000.00 to the Indianapolis Zoo for all the plants in the "Living Deserts of the World" exhibit, housed in a newly constructed 80 foot geodesic dome. Plants and animals from around the world, including some plants which are considered endangered species, live together in this truly outstanding exhibit which the Indianapolis Garden Club made possible. The funds were raised by selling blocks of tickets to two concerts - one by Anne Murray and one by Linda Rondstadt - at a new outdoor center, and by two sales of hooked rugs from Cynthia and Preston McAdoo of Vermont.

When the Heritage Preservation Center, the new home of Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana, was dedicated, the Indianapolis Garden Club co-hosted the event with Historic Landmarks. The celebration evening included a benefit to raise funds for the landscaping of the building which handsomely combines a renovated historic home and a contemporary office structure. Sheila MacQueen enthralled the guests with her flower arranging demonstration. Plants and garden accessories were sold.

Under the inspiration of a dedicated teacher and in memory of one who had recently died, the students at an inner-city school reclaimed ground adjacent to the school for a garden in which the children not only learn gardening and earth sciences, but economics and manners. The Indianapolis Garden Club was pleased to be able to donate a heater and potting benches for a greenhouse.

The Indianapolis Garden Club co-sponsored with the James Whitcomb Riley Memorial Association a day-long Spring Garden Celebration that brought food, fun and flowers to The Children's Patio at the renowned James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children at the Indiana University Medical Center in Indianapolis. The event benefitted and promoted an endowment fund that has been established to refurbish three hospital courtyards which bring solace to hospital staff and families of patients.

For many members, the monthly meetings in members' homes are the highlight of the Garden Club year. Programs have brought a wide variety of subjects to our attention, from

hands-on design workshops to “Flora and Fauna of Australia” to non-toxic pest control. The Garden Club has studied horticulture and conservation, written Congressmen, held in-house flower shows, visited such diverse places as members’ gardens and the city’s solid waste treatment facility, which is a mighty incinerator that is managed in an environmentally friendly way. A delightful day trip took members to Columbus, Ohio, to see AmeriFlora ‘92 during the first week of its opening.

Led by the Conservation Committee, the Indianapolis Garden Club took a two-day trip to learn about prairies, bogs and dunes at the state’s National Park on the southern tip of Lake Michigan, Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore. Because of diverse habitat, this relatively small park currently ranks fourth in plant diversity in the over 350 National Parks and Monuments run by the National Park Service.

The 100th birthday of Mrs. Bowman Elder (Madeline Fortune) was celebrated with a presentation of 100 pink “Oceana” roses at the November, 1989, meeting. Mrs. Elder, who was a charter member of the Indianapolis Garden Club and an Honorary member at that time, received the GCA Distinguished Service Medal in 1983. Mrs. Elder was known throughout the country for her work with orchids. She died at the age of 102 in 1992.

A Memorial Grove on the grounds of the Indianapolis Museum of Art was dedicated on Earth Day, 1990, with the planting of “Sweet Magnolia” (*Magnolia virginiana*) and “Red Buckeye” (*Aesculus Pavia*).

“As the flowers in our garden grow so do the friends in our lives.” Members of the Indianapolis Garden Club work together to study horticulture, conserve the environment and improve our city. They have built strong friendships.

1993-1997

The Indianapolis Garden Club has enjoyed a rich history of significant activity in the Community. Working in a collaborative manner with many well-established institutions, the club has simultaneously provided members with numerous educational opportunities while improving the environment. Reviewing the past five years brings to the forefront several community projects that have exemplified such effort.

Having previously donated funds for the Indianapolis Zoo’s Desert Biome, the opportunity to cooperate on the development of student guides attracted the club’s interest. In 1993 the Garden Club provided the funding for laminated guide sheets for the plants and animals in the Desert Biome. The beneficial materials were appreciated by school children and teachers alike. In the spring of 1997, the club voted to support and participate in the development of the Zoo’s new White River Gardens Project. An heirloom perennial garden will be the focus of the club’s commitment.

The Holliday Park Nature Center Project is a joint effort involving a neighborhood association, The Friends of Holliday Park, and the city of Indianapolis Parks and Recreation Department. In 1994 the members pledged to support and to participate in the planning of the library dedicated to nature studies. This commitment spans five years and involves individual pledges and a very substantial gift from the family of Mrs. Edna W. VanRiper. The ground breaking for the project is scheduled for 1998.

The Indianapolis Garden Club proposed the first recipient of the GCA's Scholarship Committee's Elizabeth Abernathy Hull Award for early environmental education. Indianapolis Public School #56 teacher Darlene Gosnell won for her work in establishing an outdoor garden and classroom that the Garden Club had helped to fund.

The club's Conservation Committee spearheaded another project to benefit a city school. In 1995-1996 the committee worked in collaboration with Indianapolis Public School #60 and a neighborhood association to improve an unsightly corner of the schoolyard. Under the direction of consultant Kay Grimm, the children planned, planted and are learning to care for a lovely neighborhood garden.

Specially planned trips continue to give our members opportunity to study and view conservation issues. In October 1992 forty members had taken an overnight trip to the Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore to learn of the endangered wildlife and plants in that region. In 1994 members took a bus day trip to Big Walnut Preserve, a Nature Conservancy property in Putnam County that Garden Club members had helped to fund two decades ago. In the spring of 1996 club members had a guided tour of wildflowers and hiked through Holliday Park. In April 1997 the Conservation and Horticulture Committees planned a tour of the Garden at Oakhurst and the Minnetrista Cultural Center in Muncie, Indiana.

Throughout the past five years members of the Indianapolis Garden Club have participated in many fundraising activities. For three years a "Greens Sale" was held at Christmas time. In 1993 Penelope Hobhouse was invited from England to speak at a fundraising luncheon where we sold her latest book, "Gardening Through The Ages".

To assist in the development effort, club members have sold note cards, plants, bulbs, and gardening books. The success in raising funds has permitted the Indianapolis Garden Club to make substantial contributions to many groups such as The Children's Garden for the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children, The Nature Conservancy, Indianapolis Project 180, Save The Redwoods, The Hoosier Environmental Council, Indianapolis Greenways and numerous funds of the Garden Club of America.

In 1996 the members voted to try a new project, one that generated funds as it focused on beautiful gardens. "A Garden Walk" was born on May Day of that year. Nearly 500 invited guests toured five lovely gardens. The following year found the Garden Walk being held in June. Again five beautiful gardens delighted hundreds of garden enthusiasts and raised considerable funds.

For the past five years, the IGC has had five very different flower shows. In June 1993 the "Cut and Show Flower Show" held at the Meridian Street Methodist Church was open to the public. An in-place flower show had teams working on arrangements. Themed shows were held, such as "Un Jour Dans Le Jardin" and a "Petit Fleur Show" featuring window boxes, straw hats and other creative displays. The club has held workshops and had speakers to delight our members as they continue to learn about flowers and arranging.

In 1996-1997 the club offered the MASTER GARDENER course. Approximately 20 members participated in this continuing education opportunity. In May 1995 the club approved a revision of the bylaws. In 1996 the Garden Club archives were given to the Indiana Historical Society for preservation. In June 1995 the club bestowed honorary membership upon three esteemed members: Mrs. Edward W. Harris, Jr. ("Punch"), Mrs. Alfred J. Stokely (Jeanette), and Mrs. Samuel R. Sutphin (Lisa), who have made countless contributions to the Indianapolis Garden Club and The Garden Club of America.

Throughout our history, the club has grown and flourished just as a beautiful garden does. The senior members resemble the stately trees providing strength and shade with

root systems that run deep and secure. The perennial blooms of members with years of service bring us vivid color, variety and a resilient spirit. The newest members are like the seedling plants to be nurtured and cultivated. All the garden plants are viable and essential to the landscape plan – trees, shrubs, flowers and starts. Each club member is a valued and necessary volunteer.

1998 -2003

In the Fall of 2003, The Indianapolis Garden Club was named “Outstanding Civic Organization in the State of Indiana” by the Indiana Chapter of the Association of Fund Raising Professionals.

As we peruse the accomplishments of the Garden Club over the past six years, it is evident that the award was well deserved. A dedicated corps of “Can do women” piloted by unusually gifted presidents made it all possible. Those holding the gavel during this time were Sharon Neighbours, Mary DeVoe, Catherine Lawson and Jean Quinn who began her term in the Fall of 2003.

Community involvement and projects which enhanced the beauty and viability of our city took center stage during this time span.

The dream of a “*Heritage Garden*” at White River Gardens was realized with the opening of this state of the art botanical garden adjacent to the Indianapolis Zoo. The Indianapolis Garden Club made a commitment of \$60,000 and its gardening expertise to create, with the staff, a perennial garden featuring plants from the 1890-1920 period. The garden also features a handsome sculpture entitled “The Seasons” which was a gift from Emily and Gil Daniels, club members who had piloted the project.

The opening of the “*Holliday Park Nature Center*” located in one of the city’s prime suburban parks was a high point of the year 2000. From individual contributions over a five year period, The Indianapolis Garden Club raised \$100,000 to fund the building and stocking of a fine nature reference library within the Center. An additional \$40,000 was given by the family of club member Edna Van Riper in Edna’s honor.

A year after the opening of the Center, Indianapolis Garden Club voted to contribute \$50,000 to the “Friends of Holliday Park” to underwrite a curriculum revision of the “*Environmental EdVentures*” program and several members volunteered to assist with this conservation project. The “*Environmental EdVentures*” curriculum is now used throughout the entire Indianapolis Park System.

Each Spring, after a long Indiana winter, the city of Indianapolis welcomes the “*Indianapolis Garden Club Garden Walk*” to uplift spirits. Carefully selected gardens are open to the public and Club participation is at its height. A lavish luncheon at Woodstock Club welcomes ticket holders who wish to attend. Over a six year period in excess of \$100,000 has been added to our Community Project Fund. Hats off to the following Co-chairmen during this time frame: Ann Knall and Katie Kruse, Cathy Lawson and Hilary Salatich, Katie Kruse and Anne Moss, Anne Moss and Katie Steele, Katie Steele and Cynthia Yeo, and Cynthia Yeo and Katie Betley.

Always looking for projects which would bring forth civic improvement while keeping the purpose of our club in the forefront, a “Community Task Force” was formed in 2000. Then Vice-President, Connie Earle, headed this committee which explored a number of possibilities. From the findings of this productive group, the consensus of our club was to support an Indianapolis Central Library expansion.

In partnership with the Indianapolis-Marion County Public Library Foundation, the Indianapolis Garden Club is presently creating a “*Cafe’ Garden*” which can be accessed from the library. The garden will feature thornless honeylocust trees (*Gleditsia triacanthos* variety *inermis*) which will shade tables that will be available to library visitors. Garden Club guidance and a \$75,000 gift were earmarked for this project in the heart of our city.

Flower arranging phobia has been dispelled to some extent as members were encouraged and cajoled to “learn by doing”. Club workshops and demonstrations on flower arranging were offered by our own talented flower arrangers, by zone consultants, and by outside professionals. Confidence buildup in this area resulted in a number of **outstanding flower shows**.

On a pretty Spring day in 1999, members of the Club gathered at the country home of Jan Sweeney for an In-club flower show entitled “*Posy Adventurin with Tom and Huck*”. Teams arranged in sap buckets, teapots, various treasures found in Aunt Polly’s attic, and in assorted baskets. Jan and Lynn Stokely were Co-Chairmen of this fun event.

In 2000, “*From Garden to Gallery*”, a Club Flower Show, was held in various artists’ studios at the Stutz Business Center. We “Strutted our stuff at the Stutz” with a fabulous show headed by Co-Chairmen Edna Van Riper and Judy Bracken.

“*Celebrating the Art of Nature*” was the title of the Indianapolis Garden Club flower show in the Fall of 2001. This Small Flower show was held at the Indianapolis Art Center in conjunction with the opening of an exhibit by noted regional nature artist Paul Sweany. Two classes featured works by Art Center potters and glass blowers with participants arranging in the artists’ fine pieces.

The Show’s horticulture exhibit earned a “*Judges Commendation*” and “Best in Show” was an espalier grown perfect pear.

“Celebrating the Art of Nature” also featured a Nature Conservancy, Indiana Chapter, exhibit which received the “*Marion Thompson Fuller Brown Award*” The outstanding display touted the “Kankakee Sands Prairie, Native Plant Nursery and Seed Bank” established to carry out the ecological restoration of the Kankakee Sands Prairie.

A lovely Thursday evening dinner in the Art Center library was served to over one hundred members and guests. Fifty area garden clubs were invited for Friday and on Friday evening two hundred people attending the opening of the Paul Sweany Exhibit were treated to a joyous burst of flowers provided by the Indianapolis Garden Club.

The logistics and diplomacy required in this show tested the patience of Co-Chairmen Judy Bracken and Hilary Salatich and the Committee. A day before the big community event, we discovered that promised stands to hold the arrangements were not pulled from the storage area or painted to compliment the Sweany show. One vivid memory is of former president, Mary DeVoe wielding a paint brush for hours over a number of huge stands which the Committee had wrestled from storage. But then we are “The Can Do Women”!

Perhaps the most spectacular flower show of recent Indianapolis Garden Club history was held at Oldfields (The Lilly house and gardens of the Indianapolis Museum of Art.) “*Art in Bloom at Oldfields*” brought forth the best creative talents of club members as they filled the historic house with breathtaking arrangements as well as sharing their garden delights for the horticulture division of the show. It was estimated that the show brought over six hundred visitors to Oldfields over a four day period. “*Art in Bloom*” served as a fitting tribute to Indianapolis Garden Club members, the late Lily Ridgely Lilly, mother of former Oldfields owner Josiah K. Lilly and Josiah’s wife Ruth Brinkmeyer Lilly. Hilary Salatich and Jan Sweeney chaired this memorable event.

Ever mindful of its purpose to “Stimulate the knowledge and love of gardening”, the Indianapolis Garden Club has always kept **horticulture** on one of its front burners. In 1998 the club held a joint meeting with the Indiana Horticultural Society to explore “*Similarities and Contrasts of English and Japanese Gardens*”. Later in the year the club enjoyed a wildflower slide with emphasis on perennials native to Indiana. In 1999, Dick Crum (Dr. Dirt), The horticulturist of Indianapolis addressed the club and joined us on a tour of White River Gardens. The program for one of our meetings was viewing the GCA film “*Native Plants-then and now*”.

Visiting the well known “Flower Barn” in Lebanon, Indiana piqued our interest in dried flowers and John Schaust, Holliday Park Manager took us back in time to consider “*Pioneer Uses of Plants*”.

Twenty three Indianapolis Garden Club members, accompanied by Dick Crum and Mark Zelonis, Director of Oldfields Gardens and Grounds of the IMA traveled to Philadelphia for “The Big Show” and we all returned with grandiose plans for our own gardens. .

“*Holliday Park Horticulture Happenings*” was the title of a fun and full day of horticulture planned by Co-Chairmen Hilary Salatich and Mary Stanley. Members brought prize flowers, plants, and branches from their gardens to be judged by GCA judges. Also judged were a number of imaginative planters using a wide variety of plant material. A nature walk through Holliday Park led by a staff member was followed by a scavenger hunt with gardening gloves given to the winning team. Flowers and trees had to be identified with both common and Latin names.

Well received by the club was a program with slides given by Maryrose and Fred Wampler. They published Trees of Indiana and Wildflowers of Indiana with Maryrose rendering the art work and Fred the text.

Roses came to our club in abundance in January of 2001 when renowned rose gardener and author Mary Dorra presented a slide show for our pleasure. We invited the Indianapolis Rose Society and other friends to join us.

In May of 2002, the Garden Club of Louisville invited members of our club to visit a number of their members’ gardens. It was a delightful day which included luncheon at the Louisville Country Club. Also around this time, Julie Goodrich attended the GCA Horticulture Workshop, sharing her inspirations upon her return.

Over the past six years horticulture workshops have been offered by our Horticulture chairmen, often in preparation for entries in zone and GCA annual meetings. Julian Gammons, former estate manager for the Allan Clowes Estate gave one of these workshops.

Our 2003 Annual Meeting featured a propagation demonstration given by Sally Hoffman, Zone X Horticulture Representative.

“*Hort Moments*” at monthly meetings were helpful to members as were handouts and articles in our IGC News and Notes.

The Garden History and Design Committee has documented for and submitted to GCA a number of Indianapolis and Indiana gardens for inclusion in the Smithsonian’s “*Archives of American Gardens*”.

A recent survey of club members indicated that **Conservation** ranked high on the list of members’ interest. Much of this interest has been generated by club members who have been in the forefront of fulfilling the GCA commitment to the environment. One standout who must be recognized is Dickie Bookwalter. Dickie received the “*GCA Club Certificate*

of *Achievement for Conservation*” and the *“Zone X Conservation Award”*. Among her many GCA appointments was to the National Affairs and Legislation Committee where she has served as Vice-Chairman and Secretary.

In the past six years, the Indianapolis Garden Club has explored *“Conservation and Golf Courses”* with golf course designer Pete Dye and his wife Alice, champion golfer and PGA Board member.

Scheduled visits to Dow AgroSciences, Cinergy, Garfield Park, Southside Landfill, and The Indianapolis Water Company helped us to broaden our visions of conservation issues. A number of club members helped with a “Keep Indianapolis Beautiful” project at the Abraham Lincoln Elementary School entitled “Partners in the Environment”.

In 2001, the Conservation Committee organized the planting of 800 daffodil bulbs in the *“Phyllis Vonnegut Memorial Garden”* at the Holliday Park Nature Center, presented a panel discussion on the workings of the Indiana Department of Environmental Management and organized a “garlic mustard pull” in Marott Park.

Kathy Banks, Purdue University Professor and Director of the EPA Midwest Hazardous Substance Research Center presented a fascinating program on “pollution remediation with plants”. In addition, Lynn Jenkins of the Indiana Wildlife Federation inspired our members to consider “creating a backyard wildlife habitat”. Following her presentation, club members visited a habitat in Zionsville.

In the Fall of 2003, Meg Starrow, President of Starrow, Kinsel and Associates talked to the Club about the *“Historic Park and Boulevard System as Designed by George Kessler”*.

The Conservation Committee had a good excuse to visit “Garfield the Cat’s” home and the property of his creator Jim Davis in Muncie. The group viewed an innovative “wastewater treatment system using plant life for purification” and strolled the lovely “native prairie” on the Davis property.

Bringing our club close to the GCA family was achieved by the dedication of members who accepted **zone and national appointments**.

During the past six years, Dickie Bookwalter served as Vice-Chairman and Secretary to the “National Affairs and Legislation Committee” and as Zone X Representative to the “GCA Development Committee”. In 1998, Liz Jameson served as Vice Chairman and Secretary to the “Public Relations Committee” and Nancy Duck was Zone X Representative to “Medal Awards”. Nancy later was Zone Representative to the “Nominating Committee”. Mary Rogers was the Zone X Representative to “The Founders Fund Committee” and Ann Wallace was a member of the “Administrative Publications Committee”.

Sheila Hughes and Judy Bracken, Vice Presidents for GCA Conservation and National Affairs and Legislation Committees, and Jean Quinn, Zone Representative for the Committees represented us well. In 2000 and 2001, Sharon Neighbours served as the Assistant Chairman of Zone X, and in 2002 as Vice-Chairman.

In 2003, Sharon was appointed Zone X representative to the “GCA Admissions Committee”.

Jan Sweeney and Hilary Salatch are Prospectives in the **GCA Flower Judging** Program and when certified will join the ranks of judges which include Edna Van Riper and Jeanette Stokely (Emeritus).

In June of 2001, the “Can Do Women” did it again when the Indianapolis Garden Club hosted the **Garden Club of America Zone X Meeting**. *“Another Bloomin’ Meeting”*

was a huge success and beautifully planned by Co-Chairmen Nancy Duck and Jean Quinn. Members stepped forward to house delegates, give dinner parties, meet planes, arrange flowers etc. Long ago, one of our Garden Club members made the following comment; "I've lived through two World Wars and The Great Depression. I guess I can live through another Zone meeting".

America's heartland seemed like an ideal location for the **"2003 Conservation and National Affairs & Legislation Committees Meeting"**. Dickie Bookwalter and Jean Quinn, Co-Chairmen, were up to the challenge of planning the four-day Indiana segment of this event devoted to agriculture and energy. Club members and various community and state organizations gave of their expertise and time to help make the meeting a grand success.

During the years of 1998 through 2003, a number of awards were presented to individual members by our Club, Zone X and by GCA.

"The Mrs. John N. Carey Memorial Award" for outstanding service to our Club during a given year was awarded to Margaret Sheridan Krauss, Jean Quinn, Sharon Neighbours, Jan Sweeney, Mary Jane Baxter and Connie Earle.

"The GCA Certificate of Appreciation" was presented to Edna Van Riper in 1998. Dickie Bookwalter was awarded the *"GCA Club Certificate of Achievement for Conservation"* in 1998 and the *"Zone X Conservation Award"* in 1999. Nancy Duck was honored with the *"GCA Club Certificate of Appreciation"* in 2001 and was honored again in 2001 with the Zone X *"Creative Leadership Award"*.

At the Club's festive Christmas luncheon in 2003, Hilary Salatich was awarded the *"Garden Club of America Medal of Merit"* and Club friend Reid Williamson, President of Historic Landmarks was honored with the *"GCA Club Historic Preservation Certificate of Acknowledgment to Non-members"*.

Contributions to worthy organizations and projects over the last six year period were numerous and included the following: GCA Endowment Fund; Founders Fund; GCA Scholarship Fund; GCI Scholarship Fund; Blue Star Memorial; Land Trust; World Gardening; Central Indiana Land Trust; Friends of Holliday Park; Holliday Park Nature Center Library; Hoosier Environmental Council; Indianapolis Greenways; Keep Indianapolis Beautiful; Nature Conservancy of Indiana; Riley Memorial Association (Children's Garden); Save -the Redwoods League; Student Conservation Association; White River Gardens; Indianapolis Museum of Art; James Whitcomb Riley Memorial Association; and the Indianapolis Marion County Public Library Foundation.

Our Garden Club family will long remember with love and affection those **members who died** during the past six years. They are Phyllis Maish Vonnegut, Jane Weldon Kinghan Myers, Sallie Eaglesfield Gould, Elizabeth Gilbert Fortune, Anne Ayres Taylor, Eleanor Dickson Frenzel and Eldreda (DeDe) Lowe Nie.

With a firm foundation on which to stand, the Indianapolis Garden Club will journey into a bright future. We will know that our club, in concert with GCA clubs throughout America, will continue to build a formidable history of service to "Our Fair Land".

As we move ahead to new vistas,, may we occasionally pause to look back to past joyous years and to remember "from whence we have come"

Lockerbie was named a Bicentennial project of permanent value by the National Conference of Mayors. The Indianapolis Garden Club had a “Blooming Good Year” with many activities and opportunities offered its members and its continued monetary donations to the community. Knowing that the Garden Club of America’s 2011 Annual Meeting will be held in Indianapolis, the Flower Show, “Knowledge,” was held in the fall 2009 at the Indianapolis-Marion County Public Library Main Branch. Co-Chaired by Linda Ford and Alice Hillis, it was a creative, unique, and memorable show. Each chapter in the Horticulture and Flower Arrangement divisions was given the title of a book to interpret. In addition to Horticulture, Flower Arrangement, and Photography, a Conservation/Educational Exhibit was done by Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, focusing on an IGC funded project with them, and a Professional Designers Exhibit “for Exhibit Only.”

Members were prepared for the show with class offerings in photography by Ian Adams, container arrangements by Altum's Garden Center, and flower arranging interpretation by Hilary Salatich.

With the flower show completed early in the fall of 2009, the general meetings offered programs on the following: a Garden Railway, constructed from dried plant materials, opening in November 2010 at the Eiteljorg Museum; Conner Prairie Restoration plans including the construction of a Prairie Garden; Orchid Propagation and Growth by Erich Michel; a Holiday Program with music provided by St. Richard's School's 4th and 5th grades choir; Wind Energy and Solar Panels by Laura Arnold; Woody Plants by Peter Zale from Zanesville, OH; Botanical Jewelry by GCA Judge Cathy Miller; and a visit to the Council Ring in the Jens Jensen Garden at Marian University, IGC's 2009 Community Project, and IGC's Centennial Tree Project, the planting of 20 Cedar Trees around the Player's Stage in the Jensen garden. IGC's Nancy Duck presented an interesting and educational overview of Jensen the man and his gardens prior to touring the gardens.

Mary Stanley, past president, again volunteered her time and professional talents by drafting and subsequently adopting the Indianapolis Garden Club's Whistle Blower, Document Retention, and Conflict of Interest policies. Also, Mary chaired the By-Laws "Update" Committee with committee members Katie Betley, Judy Heidenreich, Holly Lee and Hannah Ten Eyck. The Garden Club of America is 100 years old! In honor of this significant milestone, in April the Indianapolis Garden Club and the Indianapolis Museum of Art Horticulture Society (also celebrating the 100th anniversary of Oldfields) joined forces to hold "Les Belles Fleurs" in the Deer Zink Pavilion. Chaired by Hilary Salatich and Jan Sweeney, the flower show was an unprecedented success with rave reviews from the IMA, the judges and 1800 visitors! "Les Belles Fleurs" was a weekend long event that kicked off with an exciting opening night party in the French street fantasy created by honorary member Toomie Farris (and the IGC) enjoyed by nearly 200 members and guests. The festivities continued with an entertaining lecture by Amy Stewart, award winning author of books on the perils and pleasures of the natural world - including NY Times best seller, Flower Confidential. And while "Les Belle Fleurs" played a huge role and was the focus of most of our programing, it was just a part of the year's events.

We started in September with a visit from David Rubin, just returned from his sabbatical at the American Academy in Rome as the GCA Rome prize winner in Landscape Architecture. Other programs, planned by Gina Bremner, Katie Kruse and Nancy Meek included a lecture and tasting from historian Cara Dafforn about the Teas of the Civil War and a performance by the Broadripple Golden Singers at our holiday luncheon. After the New Year, we kicked into high gear preparing for “Les Belles Fleurs” with a demonstration by Alan Thompson of McNamara Florist on floral design mechanics, a presentation on plant conditioning and grooming by our own GCA horticulture judge, Jan Sweeney, and a show & tell by Hilary Salatich (also a GCA floral judge) on designing a floral headpiece.

The Conservation committee chaired by Jill Failey and Beth Seger, took us on an educational field trip to Covanta Energy – eighteen members donned hard hats and watched “our” trash moving from collection to incineration to steam heat. The committee worked with Conner Prairie so that conservation was represented by an exhibit at “Les Belles Fleurs”. Jill and Beth also traveled to Washington D.C, as the delegates to the NAL conference in Washington D.C.

Jody Petrie and Becky Cleveland, Horticulture committee chairs, planned terrarium and terrace container workshops to encourage members to create entries for “Les Belles Fleurs”. And at the holidays, the club had beautiful blooming amaryllis and paper whites thanks to the annual Horticulture committee fundraiser. Jody also represented our club at the Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference in Austin Texas.

The Community Projects committee, chaired by 1st VP, Betsy Bosway presented two outstanding projects to the membership. The club voted to donate \$25,000 to the restoration of the Ruins section of Holliday Park, specifically to create a garden next to the south side of the new Shimmer Fountain. \$5000 was given to the Crown Hill Foundation to beautify the gravesite of President Benjamin Harrison. Other contributions were: \$800 to the President Benjamin Harrison Home, \$300 each to Friends of Riverdale and Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, \$200 each to the GCA’s Endowment Fund, Founder’s Fund, Scholarship Fund, Save the Redwoods and Student Conservation Association, \$100 each to the Garden Club of Indiana’s Land Trust and Scholarship Fund, \$50 to the Blue Star Memorial and \$25 to World Gardening.

In order to be better stewards of the club’s money, a Finance committee chaired by Treasurer, Katie Betley, was formed. This year, the committee organized, set travel policy, and consolidated our various designated funds. Going forward, the Finance committee will work with the President and Treasurer to approve the budget, do long range planning and make recommendations to the board.

The Garden Walk, held just six short weeks after “Les Belles Fleurs” was, again... a tremendous success adding over \$30,000 to our Community Projects account. The event, chaired by Polly Jameson and Megan Rhodehamel has become a community standard and this year’s focus on owner-tended gardens was noted and appreciated by our loyal patrons (as well as the perfect weather)!

Sue Welch and Alice Hillis attended the Zone X President’s Council meeting in Columbus Ohio and Alice Hillis and Beth Seger were the club delegates to the GCA Annual (Centennial) Meeting in Philadelphia.

In December, we honored Katie Kruse with the Garden Club of America Certificate of Appreciation for her long-term, ongoing, exuberant support of the Indianapolis Garden Club. At our annual meeting Jan Sweeney and Hilary Salatich were presented with the ABCD award for their outstanding planning and execution of “Les Belles Fleurs”. And Polly Jameson was given the Mrs. John N. Carey Award for her leadership and commitment over the past 2

years to the ongoing success of the Garden Walk. Edna Woodard was voted an Honorary Member of the Indianapolis Garden Club and that special status was recognized by a recounting of her many accomplishments and awards during her long membership in the IGC and the Garden Club of America.

We welcomed five new members; Sally Gray, Amie Lacy, Pam Mahoney, Michelle Rogers and Nancy Mahany. And we said sadly said goodbye to Ann Wallace and Emily Daniels with lovely tributes read in their honor.

Yes, this was quite a year. It was a year full of opportunities for the club to showcase their skills and talents. And the members proved themselves to be up to the challenge and quite adept – especially at multitasking.

Other fall programs planned by Program Chairman, Amy Cooke included a humorous presentation by Mike Nowak, CHICAGOLAND gardening magazine columnist and radio garden show host, and a visit to Allisonville Nursery for a demonstration of Thanksgiving and Christmas decorations by Jeff Gatewood. At the annual Christmas Luncheon, we were entertained by the Young Voices of Indiana, a group that is involved in community service as well as music education. The new year began with a conservation meeting and a presentation on the benefits of biochar as a soil additive by Adam Seger of Aemerge. Walt Kuhn of Roberts Camera shared his expertise in photography and Mary Starnes, the Windowbox Gardener, demonstrated her skills in designing unusual and dramatic container gardens. Sixteen IGC past presidents were honored at the Annual Meeting, and Mark Zelonis, Ruth Lilly Deputy Director of Environmental and Historic Preservation at the Indianapolis Museum of Art, was invited to be an honorary member of the Indianapolis Garden Club.

Members who hosted the Club were Benita Thomasson, Gaye Mueller, Katie Steele, Beth Seger, and Diann Woodard. Sharon Hoffman and Elizabeth Wiese planned the meals and the Christmas Luncheon, while Linda Ford handled meeting arrangements.

Members representing the IGC at the national or zone level were Julie Shortridge, Shirley Meneice Conference, Washington, DC; Jody Petrie and Alice Hillis, Zone X Meeting, Akron, OH; Katie Steele and Jane Tuttle, NAL Conference, Washington, DC; Alice Hillis and Jill Failey, GCA Annual Meeting, New Orleans. Amy Cooke and Jan Sweeney served as Zone X Chairmen for Awards and Flower Show respectively. Hilary Salatich served on the GCA Finance Committee.

The Finance Committee chaired by Treasurer Katie Betley recommended a \$10 dues increase to cover the \$10 increase in GCA dues. It was also decided to charge separately for the Christmas luncheon. Conservation Chairmen Katie Steele and Jane Tuttle chose GCA's "Bridge the Gap" campaign for the "Save the Redwoods League" as this year's focus. As a result, the GCA was able to retire the debt on this worthy project. Horticulture Chairs Becky Cleveland and Jody Petrie continued to arrange varied learning and work opportunities for the membership. In the fall, a "Learn and Labor" workshop was held at Holliday Park on overwintering non-hardy plants. The Christmas sale of amaryllis and paperwhite bulbs was followed by a pruning workshop in February. A native plants lecture and wildflower walk was held in April. A monthly newsletter article, "Hort Corner," was both timely and informative.

Historian Helen Miles spent the year photographing all members to be made into a pictorial directory for our membership. A Photography Study Group was led by Sue Welch. It was a combination of online tutorials through the GCA website and hands-on assignments. Building on her previous experience, Garden History and Design Chair Julie Shortridge, along with Pam Mahoney, documented Frogmore, the gardens of Wendy and Tom Neal. It is the first Zionsville property in the GCA Collection Archives of American Gardens (AAG Garden #IN067). Newsletter Editor Benita Thomasson continued to upgrade our online newsletter. It has proven to be an excellent way to further membership communication and involvement. Through hard work and willing community partners, the Garden Walk Committee, chaired by Megan Rhodehamel and Gretchen Witt, raised a new record of \$31,000 for our Community Fund. An enhanced website and increased sponsorship dollars contributed to the great success.

First Vice-President Beth Seger and the Community Projects Committee worked diligently to bring worthy projects to the membership. The IGC approved contributions to Farm Works Indy, \$3000; Bridge the Gap campaign through the Save the Redwoods League, \$2500; Benjamin Harrison Presidential Site, \$1250; Indianapolis Public Library Foundation's Garfield Park Summer Reading Program and Earth Friendly Festival, \$1000; Les Belles Fleurs du Cirque, in support of community outreach, \$2500 (and \$2500 for 2015). Indiana University returned \$20,000 from the 2010 Ball Nurses Sunken Garden Project because the original plan of the proposal was not able to be implemented. This was partially due to the expansion of Eskenazi Health Center.

The IGC received highest awards at the Zone X Meeting in Akron, OH. Hilary Salatich received the Creative Leadership Award. Jan Sweeney was honored with the Judging Award, and Mark Zelonis with the Zone Horticulture Commendation. GCA Club Awards went to Ginny Smith, Club Appreciation; and Polly Jameson and Julie Shortridge, Historic Preservation. Sue Welch received the Carey Memorial Award for her outstanding leadership.

At our annual meeting, we welcomed new members Teresa Altemeyer, Pat Jacoby, Mary Ruckelshaus, and Jessica Stokely. Memorial tributes were made to Flo Miller, Billie Lou Wood, and Tish Mumford, whose many long-time contributions to the IGC will be missed.

Over 200 guests at the Preview Party were amazed at the quality and scope of our floral designs, hort entries, photography, and green roof conservation display. Seattle author Debra Prinzing lectured on Slow Flowers and conducted a workshop using locally-grown material.

As always, the Garden Walk was a big event. Diligent year-round planning and excellent weather made the 20th Annual Garden Walk another great success. Co-chairs Gretchen Witt and Mary Grein and their committee raised \$31,000 to support our Community Projects.

Under the direction of 1st Vice President Beth Seger, the Community Projects Committee received and reviewed many proposals. The IGC approved these grants:

“Friends of Holliday Park for restoration of the Ruins,” \$10,000 (plus a matching grant of \$10,000 from Central Indiana Community Foundation) “Conner Prairie Interactive History Park for the Treehouse project,” \$10,000 “Indianapolis Zoo/ White River Gardens for restoration of Heritage Gardens,” \$5000 “Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana for landscape of Morris-Butler Home,” \$4560

Indianapolis Public Library Foundation for Earth Friendly Festival, \$1000 Benjamin Harrison Presidential Site for garden enhancement, \$1000

The GCA Club Creative Leadership Award was given to Linda Ford at the Christmas Luncheon. Ginny Smith and Emerson Houck were presented the ABCD Award for their contributions to the Garden Walk. Amy Cooke was voted to receive the Carey Memorial Award for her outstanding work as Chairman of Les Belles Fleurs CIRQUE.

The Horticulture Committee, chaired by Edie Enright and Jan Sweeney, had a very successful fall sale of amaryllis, paperwhite and baby bloomer bulbs. An IGC seed share program was held in November. Members participated in planting 6000 plants at the Ruins at Holliday Park. A Holiday Horticulture/Photo Challenge was held using amaryllis and paperwhite bulbs. Members planted, grew, photographed, and submitted photos of their bulb's blooms. Our February Newsletter was a flower filled issue! Jill Failey's amaryllis won Best in Show.

The Floral Design chairmen, Nancy Mahany and Rae Wilson, organized a Floral Design Committee under the name of *The Petal Pushers*. Two floral design workshops were held. "Scents of Winter" workshop was instructed by Molly Stephan and Weezie Moore from the Garden Club of Winnetka. Arrangements created were used as the centerpieces for the Holiday Luncheon. Using spring flowers, David Strohmeyer, from The Empty Vase, shared how to create interesting floral designs in hard to use containers.

With a little help from Mother Nature providing a lovely June day, the hard work and planning of chairmen Mary Grein, Pat Jacoby and Julie Shortridge, and their committee, the 2016 IGC Garden Walk was a great success. As a result, \$33,000 has been added to the Community Projects Fund!

The Community Projects Committee, chaired by 1st Vice-President, Anne Shane, reviewed many proposals. Board Approval was given to project proposals under \$2500 including the GCA Founders Fund, Scholarship and Endowment; Garden Club of Indiana, IGC Flower Show support; Benjamin Harrison Presidential Site, plantings and trellis repair; Friends of Holliday Park, professional workshop for volunteer gardeners; and Indianapolis Public Library Foundation, seed bank. These grant awards totaled \$7000. IGC approved \$70,700 in grant awards to:

Indianapolis Museum of Art Christmas at Lilly House: \$10,000

Conner Prairie Re-landscaping of the William Conner House with native plants: \$10,000

Crown Hill Heritage Foundation Replacement of 44 Ash trees destroyed by Ash Borer: \$13,200

The Nature Conservancy of Indiana Creation of a pollinator garden at the LEEDS certified headquarters at Ohio and College: \$17,500

Keep Indianapolis Beautiful Creation of the Martindale-Brightwood Roosevelt Avenue Gateway Park at 16th Street and I-70, in conjunction with the Felige Hiywot Youth Farm Initiative: \$20,000

Rae Wilson was our worthy recipient of the GCA's Certificate of Appreciation. Alice Hillis won the Carey Award for her leadership and many contributions to the IGC. Hilary Salatich was honored for two years of work as the GCA Treasurer and her continued support to the IGC. A Gift of \$1000 in Hilary's name was given to the GCA Scholarship Fund. Eleanor "Dickie" Bookwallter was awarded an Honorary Membership in recognition for her many years of leadership and service to the GCA and the IGC.

One by-law change was made this year. By-law Section 2.3.2 and the standing Rules for Admission Committee rule #1 were changed to read the word "during" to "by" – "The Admission Committee shall meet BY the last week of April." The change was unanimously accepted.

The Conservation Committee, chaired by Jill Failey and Gretchen Witt, partnered with Random Act of Flowers to collect vases for RAF's floral arrangements. Committee members participated in the KIB planting project in the Martindale-Brightwood neighborhood. Our Conservation Exhibit, "Bees and Butterflies are Making Headlines: What's All the Buzz About?" received both the Ann Lyon Crammond Award and the Marion Thompson Fuller Brown Conservation Award at IGC's *Les Belles Fleurs* Through the Looking Glass Flower Show. It is impressive to be awarded one of these awards for Conservation and Education Exhibits, but to receive both awards is unprecedented and outstanding!

The Horticulture Committee chaired by Edie Enright and Becky Feldman once again had a successful fall bulb sale making \$1052 in profit. A Holiday Horticulture/Photography Challenge was held using the bulbs members purchased. Photos were submitted of the bulbs in bloom. Amy Cooke won this year in the Horticulture Division and Sue Welch was our Photography Winner. A Fall Workshop on Forcing Narcissus Bulbs was held in October. Ray Rogers, a GCA judge, was invited by Jan Sweeney to lead the workshop. This challenge was a Horticulture Division in our *Through the Looking Glass* Flower Show. A Native Tree Plant propagation challenge was held for the Zone X June meeting in Cincinnati. IGC propagated Burr Oak and Redbud seeds for this challenge.

An iphone photography workshop, arranged by Pam Mahoney, was held at the Indianapolis Apple Store. Members were helped in expanding their photography skills using their personal iphones.

The Floral Design Committee, alias *The Petal Pushers*, provided floral arrangements for all IGC events. Led by Co-chairs Rae Wilson and Nancy Mahany, uniquely lovely centerpieces were provided for our Evening with President Teddy Roosevelt in December, the December Holiday Luncheon, the Garden Walk Luncheon, and June's Annual Meeting. Wendy Neal led a Holiday Design Workshop for *The Petal Pushers* at the McNamara Florist downtown location.

As Alice said to her kitten, Kitty, "Oh, Kitty, how nice it would be if we could only get through into the Looking Glass House. I'm sure it's got, Oh, such beautiful things in it!" If Alice could only have seen the IGC's Flower Show *Les Belles Fleurs Through the Looking Glass*, she would have seen many lovely things. Once again, Toomie Farris transformed the Zink Pavilion at the Indianapolis Museum of Art into a wonderland . . . a perfect setting for our IGC's *Through the Looking Glass* Flower Show. A lovely Preview Party was enjoyed by almost 200 guests and was the perfect kickoff to the weekend. There were 372 entries. One hundred and seventy three ribbons were awarded, Forty Class Accommodations were given, Twelve GCA and Five IGC awards presented. Our Conservation Exhibit received both the Ann Lyon Crammond Award and the Marion Thompson Fuller Brown Conservation Award. It has been over 25 years since these two awards have been given simultaneously! Accolades were received from both the public and GCA Judges.

June 7th was a picture perfect day for our 22nd Annual Garden Walk. Pat Jacoby, Jessica Stokley and their Garden Walk Committee worked tirelessly to make the 2017 IGC Garden Walk a great success . . . Over six hundred people toured 5 incredible private gardens and raised almost \$36,000 for the IGC Community Projects Fund! This year ticket sales via Eventbrite were introduced; signage was updated; flowers from the luncheon were donated to Random Acts of Flowers; flyers on pollinators were distributed, and a Plein Air artist was placed at one of the gardens.

The Community Projects Committee, chaired by Anne Shane, 1st Vice-President, reviewed 12 grant requests. Board approval was given to those projects under \$2500 including the GCA Founders Fund, Endowment, and Scholarship, Garden Clubs of Indiana, and the Indianapolis Marion County Library Foundation to support two Seed Bank locations. These grants totaled \$2195.

Indianapolis Art Center to aid in the restoration of the Nina Mason Pulliam Sensory Path: \$6500

Indianapolis Museum of Art in support of the 2018 Horticulture Symposium: \$6500

Random Acts of Flowers funding for 2 recycle/composting bins and instruction for volunteers: \$6500

The Zone X Conservation Award was presented to Jane Elder Kunz and family for their dedication to conservation and the development of the first USDA Organic Farm in Indiana, Trader's Point Creamery. The Club's Civic Improvement Award recipient was Lisa Hurst for her dedication to Holliday Park. The Club's Appreciation Award was given to Sharon Hoffman for her loyal dedication to the IGC. ABCD Award recipients were Rae Wilson and Nancy Mahany for stimulating and educating IGC in the art of floral

design and organizing *The Petal Pushers* focus group; Katie Kruse for her enthusiastic support and dedication to our IGC; and Kim Purucker for organizing and updating the history of IGC Awards. Edie Enright received the Carey Award for her leadership and dedication in supporting the goals of the IGC.

2019-2020

The year began with an ambitious calendar that included multiple national speakers, the club's first Educational Endowment Event, a GCA Flower Show, our 25th Annual Garden Walk, and an Annual Meeting celebrating the 90th Anniversary of the club's founding. Club members worked at full-speed throughout the year – *until we were stunned in March of 2020 by news of the spreading COVID-19 virus and the growing global pandemic which followed*. First, the pre-pandemic report.

In September we welcomed First Year Members Shele French, Marta Gross, Mary Kay Leicht, Jennifer Morris, Jennifer Sanner, Marita Touhy, Katherine Wakefield, and Laura Weaver, as well as transfer member Dede Wamberg from Barrington Garden Club. Second Vice President Becky Cleveland worked hard to welcome and orient them to the club, and Shele French reportedly orchestrated a lively margarita night for the group. Our club roster included a total of 142 members, with 72 listed as Active. Wendy Fortune, Janet Nie, Sally Lanham, Pat Jacoby, and Heather Fortune hosted monthly board meetings in their homes. We kicked off our general membership meetings with a luncheon at Indiana Landmarks Center and the popular program "C-Change: Climate Conversations" arranged by Conservation committee chairs Jessica Stokely, Stephanie Paine Crossin and past chair Becky Cleveland. This dynamic national program featured C-Change Conversations founder and president Kathleen Biggins as well as Harriette Brainard. Alice Hillis hosted board members and guest speakers for a lovely dinner in her home, and Lisa Hurst arranged a tour of Holliday Park. Cathy Lawson and Kathy Hubbard invited visits to their gardens. Pam Baxter handled Meeting Arrangements, and Petal Pushers chairs Wendy Fortune and Lindsay Thornton transformed baby oak trees into delightful luncheon centerpieces which members took home to plant.

Members participated in a Fall Weed Wrangle at Riverside Park, removing invasive Japanese Honeysuckle directly across from the new Taggart Memorial Amphitheater project under construction at Riverside Park. Members of the special Community Projects 2020 Committee met with Ratio Architects to formulate the amphitheater's landscape plan funded by our \$100,000 grant made to coincide with Indianapolis' upcoming Bicentennial Celebration. With plans for a GCA flower show in spring, fall programs were intended to inspire creativity and advance skills in photography, horticulture, and floral design. At October's coffee hosted by Lisa Hurst, Flower Show chairs Jan Sweeney and Beth Seger unveiled the much-anticipated schedule to our "Les Belles Fleurs - Celebration" flower show. Visiting professional fine art photographer and GCA judge Ryn Clark shared tips on entering the photography division of a flower show and gave a workshop on iPhone photography. Michelle Rogers organized a floral design workshop at Woodstock Club with Mary Moretz of Sand Hills GC, and Co-Horts Sue Combs and Becky Feldman gave a tulip-bulb forcing workshop at Random Acts of Flowers. Their annual amaryllis and narcissus bulb sale netted a nice profit and provided beautiful blooms for our annual post-holiday photo contest.

With the Educational Endowment Fund now exceeding \$170,000, the club hosted its inaugural Educational Endowment event in November, bringing best-selling author and professional garden, floral, and interior designer James Farmer to Meridian Hills Country Club to give a floral design demonstration and entertain the club with his southern charm. Susie McClain and Mary Grein organized sales of Farmer's books and arranged a beautiful luncheon featuring Petal Pushers' seasonal floral arrangements and a menu created with Farmer's recipes. Cathy Lawson hosted Farmer and select members in her home the night before the dinner, and Claudia Hapak opened her home for Farmer to visit after the luncheon.

In December we celebrated the holidays with a festive luncheon at Woodstock Club and were entertained by Park Tudor School's Madrigal Choir and Second-Grade Choir. Awards were presented as follows: Anne Shane presented the GCA Club Civic Improvement Commendation to landscape architect Claire R. Bennett, a true pioneer in women's landscape architecture. Lucy Gonso and Mary Stanley earned the GCA Club Appreciation Award for their work on our 2020 Community Projects \$100,000 grant to Indianapolis Parks Foundation for landscaping and beautification of the Taggart Memorial Amphitheater at Riverside Park. Honorary member Toomie Farris was awarded a Special Club Appreciation Award for his years of amazing contribution to our flower shows and given a beautiful scrapbook of memories created by Lynn Stokely.

Katie Steele hosted the January meeting in the clubhouse at Olde Mill. With the growth of all things digital in GCA and in IGC, Betsy Bosway and Amy Cooke educated club members about GCA's many beautiful digital publications, the wealth of resources on the GCA website, and use of the monthly eNews to link to those resources. They encouraged members to refer to both the GCA and IGC websites and follow the Instagram and Facebook accounts maintained by both organizations. Since this is a historic record, it seems appropriate to record a few notes about club mechanics and use of technology here. Our club website is dutifully maintained by Pat Jacoby, and member usage is growing. We retired our beloved green 3-ring binder-style directory and handbook this year, moved the bylaws, club history and other contents to the IGC website, and distributed a new, streamlined paper directory created by Tracy Holt instead. We are

considering a directory app for our mobile phones. Corresponding Secretary Sally Rowland sends meeting notices and tracks attendance using Eventbrite and communicates with club members primarily through email using Google Groups. A few members still require notice by US mail. Pam Hazelett produces our beautiful monthly newsletter using Pages on her Apple Mac and distributes it electronically by email. Sally Rowland and Treasurer Mary Grein maintain most club records using Microsoft Excel, and as I type this on my personal computer, I wonder at what point these now-modern methods will become outdated! In January we were not yet using video-conferencing for meetings, but that would soon change.

Throughout the year, IGC member involvement with GCA was strong. Three club members served in national GCA roles - Hilary Salatich as Second Century Campaign Chair, Amy Cooke as Communications Chair, and Betsy Bosway as Bulletin Vice Chair. Sue Welch served as Zone X Communications Representative. Jan Sweeney and Hilary Salatich continued as Approved Flower Show Judges, and Amy Cooke, Sue Welch and Pam Mahoney fine-tuned their skills as Prospective Judges, all traveling regularly to flower shows as well as a Zone X Judging Workshop in Chagrin Falls, OH. By year's end, Amy was promoted to Approved Judge. Claudia Hapak and Pam Mahoney represented IGC at the 2019 Zone X meeting in Perrysburg, Ohio. Sue Combs nominated *Asarum Canadense*, commonly called wild ginger, for the GCA Freeman Medal and won Honorable Mention. Along with Becky Feldman, Sue attended the Shirley Meneice Conference. Jess Stokely and Stephanie Paine Crossin attended the Conservation Study Conference in Louisville, as well as the NAL Conference in Washington DC. There they met with Senators Mike Braun and Todd Young and other legislative staff to lobby for several bills, including the Great American Outdoors Act which ultimately became law in 2020. Anne Shane and Sue Welch successfully nominated The Cultural Landscape Foundation President and CEO Charles Birnbaum for GCA medal honors, and he was selected to receive the 2020 Historic Preservation Medal at the 2020 GCA Annual Meeting for his work preserving historic landscapes. IGC pledged \$10,000 to the GCA Second Century campaign, headed by Hilary Salatich. We voted to set aside \$2500 annually into administrative savings to be designated for hosting the 2027 Zone X meeting. We continued our support of the Garden Club of Indiana, and Anne Shane, Katie Kruse and I attended the 2019 Fall Meeting of the Central District and ran the raffle.

The March 11, 2020, board meeting at Heather Fortune's home was filled with talk of our April Flower Show inside the Indianapolis Museum of Art at Newfields and our upcoming March membership meeting where honorary member Toomie Farris would inspire our floral designers. Garden Walk was 12 weeks away, and we were beginning to plan for our Annual Meeting and 90th Anniversary Celebration. At the end of the meeting, we discussed recent news of a problematic new virus and wondered if and how it might affect our plans. By that weekend, the terms "coronavirus" and "COVID-19" were well-known, and the government was asking us to avoid gathering and recommending that we wash our hands and isolate at home to contain the spread. Hand sanitizer and disinfectant cleaners disappeared from store shelves, and people hoarded necessities like toilet paper.

We cancelled the March meeting and imagined – at least hoped - that this would pass after a couple weeks. We listened to daily updates from Dr. Anthony Fauci and the

Coronavirus Task Force, hoping for good news. GCA cancelled all upcoming in-person events, including its Annual Meeting in Asheville, NC. There would be no black-tie event honoring “our” medalist to attend or special ceremony to accept the Freeman Medal on behalf of IGC. Having booked flights, hotels, tours and even GCA’s extended trip offering, delegate Sally Lanham and I were disappointed by the sudden disappearance of our much-anticipated trip. Never imagining the seriousness or longevity the pandemic would have, board members held on to hope that some spring events would still take place, at least here in Indianapolis, and decided to evaluate on an as-needed basis, event by event. GCA policy effectively cancelled our GCA Flower Show, and co-chairs Jan Sweeney and Beth Seger orchestrated a postponement until April 2021. I thank them for their hours of extra work. Notably, with the show’s date so near, most of the photography entries had been received, and entrants agreed to let us store the photos for the 2021 show. During this time, our Conservation committee promoted a “Stay at Home Weed Wrangle” encouraging removal of invasives and planting of natives in our own yards. In late March, club officers met by Google video conference and made the difficult decision to postpone Garden Walk until 2021 and cancel the April board and general membership meetings. Thank you to officers Lucy Gonso, Becky Cleveland, Mary Grein, Michelle Rogers, and Sally Rowland who joined me in navigating this difficult situation. My appreciation also goes to Garden Walk chairs Betsy Cronin, Sally Lanham, Claudia Hapak, and Kim Purucker who had spent a year putting together plans for an extra-special bicentennial 2020 Garden Walk that did not take place. Since cancellation of the Walk meant no fundraising event for 2021 community grants, members generously donated additional funds when paying their annual \$250 club dues.

Pandemic news was only worsening, and in addition to isolating at home, staying at least 6 feet from others, and sanitizing our hands, we were told to start wearing masks to contain the spread. One member reportedly engaged in such excessive sanitizing that she melted the plastic on her TV remote control! Businesses struggled, unemployment soared, and government subsidies began to flow. Members learned how to have just about anything delivered, plants and potting soil included, and conversation focused on sharing lists of binge-worthy shows on Netflix and tips for coloring one’s own hair or removing gel nails. Competing and sometimes inaccurate COVID-19 tests became available, with reliable testing at the corner pharmacy drive-through eventually becoming the norm. Clearly, May’s board and general membership meetings would have to be virtual, and we would need quickly to learn some new skills to make that happen.

In early May, GCA invited all members to gather around their computers on Zoom and join GCA’s first virtual Annual Meeting, entitled “Let’s Make Lemonade Out of Lemons.” Inspired, I scrambled to figure out how to host a Zoom meeting of our own and invited IGC members to put on their garden hats, pour a mimosa and join me virtually to “Make Champagne Out of Sour Grapes.” The daily reports about the pandemic, as well as local “Stay at Home” orders, had many members feeling anxious, isolated, and perhaps a bit stressed from the 24/7 togetherness with family. Homes were filled with family members “quarantining” at home and setting up make-shift spaces to work and go to school virtually. Connecting with IGC friends on screen turned out to be a welcome diversion. I put on my hat, poured plenty of champagne in my orange juice, and had fun with the meeting, quite relieved that the technology had worked, and members had

joined. Sally Rowland even took us on a virtual golf cart tour of her neighbor's garden! It was a joy to see the unmasked faces of garden club friends, and we memorialized IGC's inaugural virtual general membership meeting with a screenshot for posterity.

While the success of that first Zoom meeting was encouraging, the news of rising COVID-19 cases was not. Healthcare workers became our heroes. Weddings and graduation ceremonies were postponed. We moved our June Annual Meeting to September, and the club's 90th anniversary passed without acknowledgement. If there was a kick-off to an Indianapolis Bicentennial Celebration, it went unnoticed. Summer did not bring the expected relief from the virus, and it became impossible to schedule future events with any certainty. We put meeting plans for 2020-21 on hold and "hunkered down" as instructed by Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb.

2020 – 2021

Sometime during the summer of 2020, reality set in that because of the global pandemic, our club would not be meeting in traditional fashion anytime soon. By this time, a few members had been sick with COVID-19 and recovered. Some had lost a friend or family member, and most were at least acquainted with someone in the community whose death was related the virus. Funeral services were limited to a handful of immediate family members or postponed indefinitely. CDC and local mandates precluded meeting indoors, and member comfort varied widely regarding outdoor gatherings. Survivors donated plasma. Reliable vaccines were on the horizon, with none yet approved. Determined to provide safe, worthwhile programs for members, we set out to create 2 types of activities for the rest of 2020 - monthly membership meetings held virtually and featuring local historians as guest speakers, and a series of outdoor, on-site tours and activities for those members comfortable putting on masks and getting together in the fresh air. Board meetings would also be held virtually, and board members frustrated by the inability to make firm plans would learn to be flexible...eventually.

Ellen Lee recruited historian and educator James Fadely, Ph.D., and Marsh Davis, President, Indiana Landmarks, to help us create a much-enjoyed speaker series. Beginning with these 2, Ellen and I met our speakers each month for lunch – introducing our masked selves and eating outdoors, happily enduring rain, wind, stifling heat, and humidity to engage in conversation with our charming guest speakers and sort out the logistics of using this novel Zoom platform. Studying online tutorials and practicing with club members and guest speakers alike, I attempted to become Zoom-proficient. I started meetings with Zoom tutorials for members, and together we learned to navigate the world of meeting virtually – muting and unmuting, changing backgrounds, and shifting from speaker to gallery view. We learned how to turn off the camera while watching and listening to a meeting so we could politely multi-task or simply conceal our relaxed pandemic appearance - dressed in loungewear and without make-up or hair-color. Fadely and Davis kicked off our program in September with a dialog about the origins of our city and its historic landmarks. James Glass, Ph.D., Principal of Historic Preservation & Heritage Consulting, shared his expertise on historic Indianapolis architecture. William

Browne, Jr., Principal/President Ratio Architects, educated us about Alexander Ralston and his Vision for Indianapolis, and we were delighted that Tiffany Benedict Browne, founder of historicindianapolis.com, was able to join him and share insights. Seated at home in front of her computer, Ellen provided context for each of our speakers with her delightful and eloquent introductions. Fifty-five to 65 members typically logged in to these meetings, with some screens revealing multiple listeners, including an occasional interested spouse. We got to visit with non-resident members and those who had left the state to isolate elsewhere.

Outside, we put on masks and joined together to enjoy “safely social” guided tours of historic Garfield Park, Conner Prairie, and Crown Hill Cemetery, with 15-25 members participating each time. Co-Horts Sue Combs and Jess Stokely arranged the Garfield tour as well as a Propagation Workshop hosted outside at the Stokely’s barn. Petal Pushers chairs Lindsay Thornton and Wendy Fortune organized a Holiday Porch Pot Workshop hosted by Sue Altum at Altum’s open-air garden center. Throughout the pandemic, Wendy welcomed members who explored her beautiful Frogmore Garden at leisure. Restaurants converted sidewalks and parking lots to outdoor eating space, and, at home, we ordered patio heaters and built firepits so we could safely socialize outside.

Online communication was our lifeline during the pandemic, and Sally Rowland (Corresponding Secretary), Pam Hazelett (Newsletter), Michelle Rogers (Recording Secretary) and Pat Jacoby (Webmaster) worked overtime to keep us connected and informed. We welcomed 5 new members: Hannah Arbuckle, Liz Brainard, Sarah Clark, Kathleen Graham, and Fionnuala Walsh. Their orientation meeting was held outside and distanced at Meridian Hills, and they each joined activities as they could for a very non-traditional first year. As members became accustomed to meeting virtually, we began to honor deceased members with tributes at our monthly meetings. Without a traditional Annual Meeting in 2019, we were behind in our recognition of members lost. By year’s end we heard tributes to 13 members: Carol Rahman, Rosalie Lange, Joan Elder, Patty Wilkins, Connie Earle, Gerd Griffith, Gil Daniels, Elizabeth Wiese, Jean Quinn, Evie Rhodehamel, Gloria Ryan, Lucy Wick and Betsy Dustman. While we did lose many beloved older members during this time, I am not aware of any direct connection to COVID-19. Thanks go to Anne Shane for organizing the tributes. Officers Betsy Bosway and Sally Rowland chaired an *ad hoc* committee which reviewed 3 areas of club interest. They concluded it is both viable and desirable to continue to hold Garden Walk annually, memorialized guidelines for our First Year Member Program and placed responsibility for the program in the hands of the Second Vice President, and confirmed the need for a Placement/Member Engagement chair to coordinate member committee involvement. Members missed having the 3-ring binder-style club handbook/directory, and we opted to bring it back next year.

Throughout the year, GCA supported the club with numerous resources, virtual programs, and regular email contact. All meetings and conferences were virtual and open to the entire membership for the first time in history. Zone X presidents met monthly to exchange ideas, and club committee chairs were invited to meetings organized by zone reps. IGC members continued to serve in national leadership roles: Amy Cooke as Coordinator of Floral Design Study Group Classes and Co-chairman of the 2023 Annual Meeting, and Sue Welch as Communications Vice Chair. Three members served as Zone X Committee Representatives: Hilary Salatich – Admissions, Anne Shane – Founders

Fund, and Amy MacDonnell Shepard – Scholarship. The 5 members in the judging program learned how to judge virtual flower shows, and Sue Welch was promoted to Approved Judge.

As the holidays approached, we were disappointed to cancel plans for a special bicentennial-themed December luncheon downtown at the Columbia Club and staged to overlook a festively decorated Monument Circle. A COVID-19 vaccination appeared to be on the horizon but not yet in the picture, and the CDC discouraged holiday gatherings, even with extended family. To create much-needed holiday magic, Sally Lanham organized surprise gift bags which were hand-delivered by “elves” to each member’s home shortly before the virtual December meeting. Changing into an elf costume during the meeting, I encouraged members to wear the silly holiday glasses found in the gift bags. Honorary Member Toomie Farris showed us how to create a holiday entry bucket, and members shared their decorated homes and holiday collectibles on screen. Alice Hillis and I shared a video in which we had presented 2 surprise awards outside in Sue Combs’ backyard: Sue Combs received the GCA Club Horticulture Award and David Gorden, Lead Landscape Architect for Mark Holeman, Inc., was presented with Honorary Membership to IGC. It was not a traditional IGC holiday luncheon, but it was festive and brightened spirits, nonetheless.

Our Hort co-chairs sold amaryllis and narcissus bulbs and hosted their annual photo contest after the holidays. Teresa Altemeyer taught us how to preserve our amaryllis bulbs after bloom. Garden author and humorist Carol Michel made us laugh in January with her “Tips for Living your Best Garden Life.” Various committees educated and entertained us with virtual games and presentations. Conservation co-chairs Stephanie Paine Crossin and Brook Johnson facilitated a virtual book club discussion of Doug Tallamy’s *Nature’s Best Hope: A New Approach to Conservation that Starts in Your Back Yard*, and, together with Jess Stokely, brought Dr. Jeffrey Dukes from Purdue to report on Climate Change in Indiana at our March meeting. We postponed our *Les Belles Fleurs – Celebration* GCA Flower Show a second time. Co-chair Beth Seger announced a revised one-day GCA show was scheduled for April of 2022 at Woodstock, and co-chair Jan Sweeney laid the groundwork for 3 spring “mini” shows to help members hone their flower show skills this year. First was the Club Photography Show, organized by Sally Gray and Sally Rowland, which was shared virtually at our March meeting.

The online roll-out of vaccine appointment sign-ups caused a joyous interruption during our January board meeting, and the steady pace of vaccination in Indiana allowed us to hold our Mini Club Horticulture Show in person. Sue Combs, Jess Stokely and Jan Sweeney organized the April show which included a whopping 146 high-quality entries on display in Mary Grein’s garage and a celebration with wine at day’s end. Sarah Carter won Best-in-Show with her forced tulips. We shared a slide show at our April meeting, the last held on Zoom. Opting to forego traveling in close quarters on a planned charter bus, twenty-five members willingly drove to Shrader-Weaver Nature Preserve near Connersville to enjoy a guided walk through old growth forest and a spectacular display of blooming *Collinsia verna* - Blue-Eyed Mary. Organized by our Conservation co-chairs, the walk was guided by Cliff Chapman, Executive Director of Central Indiana Land Trust, and Honorary Member Mark Zelonis. Until May, the board met monthly on Zoom and conducted business virtually or by email. I had the pleasure of hosting the board for dinner at my home for our only in-person gathering of the year – our year-end

board meeting – and it was filled with laughter, chatter, and hugs. Later that month, members gathered at McNamara Headquarters for the Mini Floral Design Show - our first regular, in-person membership meeting since January of 2020! Hosted by Toomie Farris and organized by Amy Cooke, Lindsay Thornton and Hilary Salatich, the show paired inexperienced members with veterans to tackle one of two challenge classes, and everyone won a blue ribbon. Spirits were high, and it was a joy to be together! With vaccinations readily available by this time, the COVID-19 outlook was improving quickly. For the vaccinated, mask mandates were relaxed, and everyday life was beginning to look normal. The race was on for inoculations to outpace the development and spread of variants of the SARS-CoV-2 virus known to be responsible for the COVID-19 illness.

After 2 years of start-stop planning by chairs Betsy Cronin, Sally Lanham, Claudia Hapak and Kim Purucker, our 25th Annual Garden Walk was wet and wonderful! Located from 16th to 42nd Streets, all but one of the urban 2020 gardens selected as a nod to the bicentennial carried over to 2021, and a beautiful 5th garden was added in a cicada-filled suburb – a fascinating phenomenon for most gardeners. At day's end we sold art and celebrated at Woodstock Club. With 40 sponsors, over \$14,000 in art sales, and a record 700+ \$35 tickets sold, we earned over \$44,000 for community grants to be made in 2022. Volunteers wore masks, we got our pandemic protocols in order, and we skipped the luncheon due to pandemic concerns. Without a Garden Walk in 2020, our 2021 Community Projects budget was funded by member donations. Community Projects Chair Betsy Bosway distributed small but meaningful grants to support Random Acts of Flowers composting program, Holliday Park Native Plant Garden at the new Outdoor Learning Lab, Benjamin Harrison Site historic gardens, Indy Urban Acres farm, Indianapolis Art Center "Dye Garden" on White River, Marian University Jens Jensen Garden, The Nature Conservancy pollinator garden, and Crown Hill Foundation's map for self-guided tree tours. We completed payment of our \$100,000 grant to provide landscaping for the Taggart Memorial Amphitheater which opens officially this summer, and we designated Riverside Park as the focus of our Olmsted 200 project.

Hilary Salatich hosted the 2021 Annual Meeting Luncheon outside on her tented lawn stretching along the banks of White River. Awards Chair Alice Hillis surprised Hilary with the award of Honorary Membership for her years of leadership and dedicated service to IGC and GCA and acknowledged 34 longstanding members with Years of Service awards. I presented the 2020 Carey Award to Anne Shane, the 2021 Carey Award to Becky Cleveland, and ABCD awards to Ellen Lee, Sally Lanham, Betsy Bosway, Sally Rowland, and Anne Shane. The truth is I could have given many more awards. I am extremely proud of the way our club worked together to pivot and find new ways to stay engaged and weather the pandemic together, and I am honored to have served as president of this remarkable group during this remarkable time.

As for COVID-19, as I write in the summer of 2021, the rise of the highly contagious Delta variant seems to be outpacing vaccinations, and mask mandates are returning. This frightening roller coaster ride that is inextricably a part of our club history continues.

Highlights included:

A festive outdoor meeting started our year at Meridian Hills Country Club featuring tables decorated with dahlia centerpieces while members listened to the outline for our up-coming year. The three-ring binder Directory was reintroduced based on feedback from members and we implemented a cell phone App called Directory Spot thanks to Marita Tuohy and Claudia Hapak. The Zone X Meeting used a virtual platform but thanks to some sneaky maneuvering, Hilary Salatich received the Zone X Appreciation Award in-person and on-screen from several past presidents and IGC Board members.

A mini-Garden Walk of 4 member's homes—Wendy Fortune, Lisa Hurst, Alice Hillis, and Mark Zelonis—was a treat for all who attended. The Crown Hill Cemetery Tree Tour in October featured a tree map provided by Garden Walk funds. A fall tour of Bill Fortune's garden was a late season thrill all thanks to Visiting Gardens chairs Sue Combs and Wendy Fortune.

Holliday Park's new outdoor Pavilion was the perfect spot to learn about trees from licensed arborist Jerome Delbridge amongst the fall foliage in mid-October. The Hort and Conservation Committees hosted an educational tour to learn about regenerative agricultural practices at WonderTree Farm in Zionsville. On the farm, owner Hunter Smith educated attendees that by rotating livestock in pastures, it allows the land to heal and then host the animals again and again. Members entered the chicken coop to help move it as Hunter pulled the structure and members "shushed" the chickens forward. Conservation hosted the November luncheon featuring Rob Ripma of Sabrewing Tours who gave many examples of how birds reflect the health of their environment. They are quite literally the metaphorical "canary in the coalmine" serving as glaring early indicators.

December featured our Holiday Luncheon at Woodstock Club. Petal Pushers, led by chairs Lindsay Thornton and Susie McClain, created beautiful crimson amaryllis centerpieces for our tables. Four members received awards—Mary Grein - Club Appreciation, Pam Mahoney – Photography, Pat Jacoby – Club Communications, and Sue Welch received the club's Medal of Merit.

February featured a Zoom format and guest speakers from GCA's Hortulus Club in CT who guided us through their Flower Show 101 program with videos and photos from their event. This meeting was recorded allowing members to view at any time. Honorary IGC member Toomie Farris hosted and regaled us with phenomenal demonstrations of flower show classes in March. His creativity and passion for floral design are contagious and we were happy to catch this "bug". To further educate the club, Hort chairs Jess Stokely and Pat Jacoby demonstrated the basics of Hort at the April meeting featuring wedding, grooming, pinching, and primping.

After nearly 5 years of planning, organizing, anticipating, and delaying—Les Belles Fleurs “Celebrate” dazzled with ingenious and inventive floral designs, exquisite horticultural specimens, and phenomenal photography. Chairs Beth Seger and Jan Sweeney oversaw the two-day event at Woodstock Club. The judges awarded many ribbons and GCA awards including three GCA awards for the Conservation Project which removed invasive Callery Pear trees along Woodstock’s driveway and replaced with native plants and bushes planted by club members. Best in Show winners were Shannon Gentile and Nancy Mahany (floral design) and Jan Sweeney (Hort).

US Senator Mike Braun has invited our club several times to visit his native plant gardens in Jasper, IN thanks to Conservation chairs yearly visits during the NAL conference in Washington, DC. Sue Combs and Wendy Fortune organized transportation and lunch for nearly 20 members to visit the senator and his wife Maureen in May. The Brauns were very gracious and guided us through their property pointing out hundreds of native plants, bushes, and trees they have added over the years. We enjoyed lunch on their lovely, shaded patio oasis and happily devoured Maureen’s home-made desserts.

May’s Endowment Luncheon was an exuberant celebration of Indiana’s state flower, the peony, by Kathleen Gagan from Peony’s Envy. Kathleen enthusiastic presentation included photos from her enormous gardens in NJ. Bare root peonies were available for sale to members and guests at the Ritz Charles. The event was beautifully organized by chair Mary Grein.

Claudia Hapak oversaw the Community Projects Committee’s dispersal of \$39,500 in grants to deserving organizations thanks to funds generated by Garden Walk. Receiving grants were Holliday Park Foundation - \$2200 for pollinator garden, Random Acts of Flowers - \$2500 for composting, Indy Urban Acres - \$3000 for seeds and supplies, Crown Hill Foundation - \$5000 for 25 native trees, Benjamin Harrison Presidential Site - \$5000 for tree preservation, Conner Prairie - \$9800 for Promised Land as Proving Ground, and Marian University - \$12,000 for Allison Mansion’s historic gardens.

In June, Garden Walk chairs Kim Purucker, Jennifer Sanner, Kasey Wakefield, and Fionnuala Walsh presented a fabulous collection of five gardens which were stunning and spectacular. The gardens tickled the fancy of guests by their diversity of plant materials, design, and dimension. From a Juliet-like balcony bedecked with climbing roses to a woodlands’ climbing fort, the gardens delighted the senses and imagination of each ticket holder. Artists from each garden joined garden owners and members at Woodstock Club afterwards for a wine and cheese celebration.

How could we cap off such a fabulous year? A beautiful garden luncheon at Michelle Roger’s home was the perfect setting for IGC’s annual meeting. Under a large tent, tables were decorated with blissful centerpieces from Toomie Farris as members toasted one another with prosecco before lunch. The club also thanks its members who served zone or national offices—Stephanie Paine Crossin as vice chair for NAL, Sue Welch as vice chair for Communications, Amy Cooke for Floral Design Study Group, Hilary Salatich for Admissions, and Amy MacDonell Shepard for Scholarship.

April was declared Indiana Native Plant month thanks to efforts by our Conservation Committee and especially Stephanie Paine Crossin. Indiana joined 46 other states as part of an initiative launched by the GCA. Our meeting to celebrate the declaration was at Newfields on the Lilly House Terrace overlooking the new pollinator garden donated by Nancy Carpenter, one of our guests and our other special guest was First Lady of Indiana Janet Holcomb. The conservation committee along with the Central Indiana Land Trust offered members a trip to Portland Arch in Western Indiana to see rare wildflowers, plants, and Indiana's only natural stone arch. May's Coffee at the Allison Mansion at Marian University allowed us to see their restored Jens Jensen gardens thanks to help from our Community Projects' grants.
